Community Roundtable Report

On the evening of November 11, our church and the Social Action Committee hosted a community roundtable on the topic of inequalities in the North Country. Open to the community, a diverse crowd of about 60 folks attended, with church members as well as many from the wider community in attendance.

The planning team had invited panel members whose work in the community focused on the impact of income inequalities with particular emphasis on access to adequate housing and food security. Speakers included Chris Rediehs (County Social Services); John Tenbusch (County Planning Office); Norma Cary (Community Development Program); Daisy Cox (Potsdam Neighborhood Center); and Maria Corse (GardenShare). Their remarks underscored the complexities of these topics and the interconnectedness of the impacts. They frequently mentioned current efforts to work more collaboratively to better meet critical needs.

An extended period for audience discussion and questions followed the panelists' remarks. Many participants wanted to find ways that they personally or their churches could help. A number of suggestions included the value of personal interactions with neighbors and others in need. Participants voiced concerns about the effectiveness of these services in helping others find more permanent solutions to the challenges they face. Some comments focused on potential overlaps or lack of coordination of efforts. Panelists responded with current initiatives to work more closely with other groups and agencies. It was acknowledged that the work of one group often helps in another area. Closing remarks centered on the importance of citizen advocacy with elected representatives in efforts to change the root causes of the economic distress we are seeing and in preserving a safety net for those in difficult situations.

When dealing with such complex topics, it is often difficult to see the road ahead. This roundtable helped sharpen our focus on these most critical and challenging issues. We will continue to explore opportunities for education, advocacy, and service delivery in addressing the impact of inequalities in our everyday lives here in the North Country. Additional roundtables will be scheduled this year on topics such as employment, transportation, and access to education and healthcare. We hope you will plan to attend our next event!

RED CROSS BLOOD DRIVE

The next American Red Cross Blood Drive will be on Tuesday, December 9, from 11:30 a.m. to 4:30 p.m. in our Social Room. We need people to give much-needed blood, and we need volunteers to help with regis-

tration and hosting duties. To schedule your blood donation, contact the Red Cross at 1-800-733-2767. To assist with registration/hosting (2 to 3 hour stints) please contact Pat Alden socialaction@uucantonny.org.

So, what happens to this donated blood? The following information from the Syracuse Red Cross office illuminates this. Typically, our drive produces between 35 to 45 productive pints. "The red cells help save the lives of trauma patients, premature babies and newborns, transplant patients, open heart surgery patients, anemic and sickle cell patients. The platelets help save the lives of cancer and leukemia patients, and bone marrow recipients. The plasma helps save the lives of trauma patients, burn victims and blood transfusion recipients. Within three days, the blood products from the drive are shipped to hospitals in northern New York, the NY Penn Region, and across the country on an as needed basis. Blood and platelets are both perishable. Red blood cells have a shelf life of 42 days, and platelets have a shelf life of just five days, so they must be replenished constantly; there simply is no substitute. The Red Cross needs blood and platelet donors to help restock the shelves. Donors of all blood types are currently needed, especially O negative, O positive, B negative, and A negative. It's the blood already on the shelves that can help save lives in an emergency situation. On average, the Red Cross must collect about 15,000 units of blood every day for patients at approximately 2,700 hospitals and transfusion centers across the country."
