IN THE INTERIM - REV. JOEL REPORTS

I've been using the term "shared ministry" to describe what a 21st-century UU congregation does. But like so many ideas in the 21st century world we live in, "shared ministry" isn't a certain program telling us just what to do. Just as I am unable - and unwilling - to promote a one-true religious path to you, I'm also unable to describe a one-true-way of being a spiritual community (regardless of my being willing or not).

Unitarian Universalism emerged about four centuries ago along with the profound shifts brought by science. By the time I was a child in a UU religious education program, most of the adults I knew assumed that if we somehow knew the positions and speeds of all the particles in the universe, we could calculate their behavior at any other time, in the past or future. Science had been so successful for us that we thought it was only a matter of time before we could predict the future with complete accuracy.

And then science itself provided evidence that this was false when the physicist Werner Heisenberg demonstrated that the more accurately a scientist measures the position of a particle, the less accurately she can know the speed, and vice versa. Heisenberg's theory disrupted this worldview, serving as evidence that the future is inherently unpredictable. The famous physicist, Albert Einstein (who had grown up Jew-ish and was an atheist), found this intolerable, and wrote, "God does not play dice."

Seventy-five years later, the physicist Stephen Hawking (also an atheist) explained that science came to show that "Einstein was doubly wrong when he wrote 'God does not play dice.' Not only does God definitely play dice, but He sometimes confuses us by throwing them where they can't be seen." This story from the history of science reflects similar patterns of change in congregational life: we can't predict our future with certainty. What we can do is shape our future by being both flexible and thought-ful. Shared Ministry, like the methods of good science, is a community of practice by peers.

And so we begin. The Search Committee will start their work almost immediately, with a visit from our Ministerial Settlement Representative, the Rev.Craig Schwallenberg on June 12 & 13. His visit has two purposes – to provide training to the Search Committee and to meet with Church Council and the congregation to outline the roles and responsibilities of each during the search.

It would be easy to think, as a congregation, that our job is done, and we can set back and wait for the results. No so! We are on this journey, too. There will be opportunities in the coming months for us to offer thoughts and ideas on what we think is important in our new settled minister. Take advantage of these opportunities as they provide guidance and direction to the search committee. Be informed. We will be providing as much information as we can as the search goes on. Ask questions. If you don't understand something about this process, find out. (This does NOT include asking search committee members to violate the principles of confidentiality.)

Most importantly, think about what will come after the Search Committee has completed their work. That is when we, as a congregation, take over and do our part to ensure a smooth and successful transition to our new minister. It is our responsibility as a church community to be prepared to walk down this path with our new minister, taking on whatever we encounter, together.

RE UPDATE

In late March, I was fortunate to attend my first Liberal Religious Educators Association (LREDA) Chapter Retreat and District Assembly in Niagara Falls. As part of the retreat, I was exposed to the idea of "experilearn" by Karen Bellavance-Grace, a 2013 Fahs Fellow and creator of Full Week Faith. She defines experilearn as "a faithful experiment in our religious lives together, which is born of and informed by a passion for our faith; subject to intentional discernment; allows room for Spirit and transcendence to attend; and uses theological reflection to evaluate and assess what works well in order to craft the next experilearn." Karen uses this term to describe a way of creating change in faith development in churches. It has me pondering how we can experilearn in our personal faith development. For an experilearn, one needs to decide what they want to learn, determine who they want to join them, define a time frame, actively learn and finally analyze or reflect on the results. For many, developing faith is an experilearn process. In our UU faith, we have many opportunities to experiment and learn. I invite you to experilearn this month, maybe delving deeper into our seven principles, our six sources, meditation techniques, social action, or compassionate communication. I hope you find inspiration and deeper faith.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE UPDATE

Good news!

We have an update on the fall canvass, and it takes the form of a very good piece of news. As of March 1, the canvass goal of raising \$211,000 through the annual pledge process was reached. We are very proud of the level of generosity displayed during the year's canvass. Thanks for responding so well the ambitious fundraising goal that we set this year! We have not forgotten about the responses to the Appreciative Inquiry; we are still organizing the information and drawing out themes and will provide a report of what the congregation shared to ensure it is accurate before we send it on to the search committee.

Stewardship & Budget and Finance Committee Retreat

This year, in the spirit of our emerging culture of shared ministry, B&F and Stewardship Chairs Milner Grimsled and Bart Harloe have had a number of conversations about how these committees might work more closely together in planning, communicating, and coordinating our annual fundraising process, which ultimately led to a constructive morning together. Meeting together, the two committees focused on three things: (1) setting budget goals that are well understood and focused on the program priorities we have developed together as a community practicing shared ministries; (2) streamlining the canvass and budgeting processes to make things as simple and straightforward as possible; (3) preparing for a new settled minister by making sure both groups are communicating a clear and common message about the process and content of the church budget. The half-day discussion led to some important understandings about the next steps we need to take to further the future successes of our fundraising processes. For example, we agreed to move forward with ways to provide for online banking and processes for accepting online donations and gifts. Details about this aspect of our work together will be in the next newsletter. Services Auction: In order to meet our overall goal for this year, additional fundraising was built into the budget. Fortunately, there are a number of "best practices" that we have developed over the years. By now, you are all aware that we are headed toward a services auction scheduled for May 16 at 6:30 p.m.. We have already received many offers of services auction items, and there is still time to submit more. Please continue to brainstorm! SOCIAL ACTION COMMITTEE UPDATE

May Social Action Shared Offering: GardenShare

Our church's social justice focus this year has been on inequalities in the North Country. A key issue faced by many North Country neighbors is food insecurity, a topic pursued in more depth by our food insecurity working group. Last fall our shared offering supported the Bearpacks program in Canton, which provides supplemental foods on weekends and school breaks to children on the free and reduced lunch program. This month's Social Action Shared Offering will be received for GardenShare, a community nonprofit that has been addressing food issues locally since 1996, seeking to end hunger and strengthen food security in the North Country. GardenShare's goal is to build a North Country where all of us have enough to eat and enough to share – where we all have food choices that are healthy for us, for our communities, and for the environment. To that end, GardenShare has a number of programs that help families facing food insecurity to improve their access to healthy food grown by local farmers. GardenShare provides CSA Bonus Bucks, which families use to purchase CSA shares, arranges for SNAP/EBT benefits to be used at farmers markets in St. Lawrence County, and connects farmers and other groups supplying locally grown produce to our food pantries. The biennial Food Day Youth Summit provides an opportunity for North Country youth to engage with issues of food insecurity and related issues. The proceeds from our **Shared Offering on Sunday May 24** will help GardenShare expand their services to end hunger and strengthen food security in our region. As we begin our new farming season, we hope you will contribute generously to this local organization in support of their mission of creating opportunities for every family to access healthy food sources.

You may contribute to GardenShare through cash in the offering plate and with checks (memo: GardenShare SASO) in the plate or mailed to the church.
