IN THE INTERIM - REV. JOEL REPORTS

The Worship Committee and I have been trying different formats for the Joys and Sorrows ritual that is part of many Sunday services. We're trying out each of the different formats across at least four weeks so as many people as possible can experience the differing formats and provide enough opportunity to see how each format works in different services.

The goal of the Worship Committee's experiment is to deepen our experience of worship and to make it more accessible to as many North Country Unitarian Universalists as possible. Both the Committee and I have had some feedback from some of you, and I'm hearing strong views (of course – we're UUs!) on the different formats, as well as on the entire experiment itself. I'm grateful for deeply felt views that are shared – the church intends to make a loving and powerful difference in our lives, so changes like these I expect, even hope, will elicit feedback. Consider the alternative of receiving no feedback, either because there aren't strong feelings, or, even worse, strong feelings but no sharing of those feelings.

I'm reminded in this moment of advice I give to younger couples when they marry. "Disagreements happen. It's only human to experience conflict. Be sure to talk about your differences – but speak with compassion. Listen with compassion." (Truth is, I used to say "have your fights, but fight fair!" – but the older I get, the more I want to avoid using metaphors that evoke violence).

The experiment with different Joys and Sorrows formats is part of the work of our interim time together. Our spiritual work of staying connected even when we are in disagreement is a life-long project for us as individuals, as community, as the world itself. It's a project that matters profoundly, and your work, as a congregation, will ripple out into the larger world. As it has for almost 200 years, and will for at least that many years to come.

Joys and Sorrows #2:

- + BEFORE THE WORSHIP SERVICE BEGINS, members of the congregation are invited to write their joy and/or sorrow on a card located on the Joys and Sorrows table at the front of the sanctuary and light a candle if you wish.
- † If you want to share your joy or sorrow with the congregation, post the card on the bulletin board so others may read it.
- † If you choose to have your joy or sorrow remain private, or only for Rev. Joel Miller, please post the blank side of the card. You may wish to put just your name on the blank side.
- + A prayer will be made for all the joys and sorrows each Sunday.
- + After the worship service, congregants will be able to read the joys and sorrows that are shared on the bulletin board.
- + Congregants may also choose to add a joy and/or sorrow to the board after the service.
- † The cards will be collected and retained by Rev. Joel Miller for follow-up as requested.

SOCIAL JUSTICE COMMITTEE UPDATE

Escalating Inequalities

This year the Social Justice Committee has been focusing on issues related to the impact of escalating inequalities in the North Country. In our community roundtable last November, we directly focused on food and housing issues. As we have all seen in the media over the past few months, inequalities underlie virtually every justice issue in the world today. Access to food, water, health care, education, safe and peaceful communities—all are problems faced disproportionately by those among us with the fewest economic resources.

Last June, the UUA General Assembly voted to adopt a four-year study-action item on "Escalating Inequalities" as a justice focus for our congregations. With summer just around the corner, we would like to suggest that some of your summer reading/viewing time be directed at resources on inequalities. A good place to start is the UUA website (http://www.uua.org/economic/escalatinginequality), and we especially recommend the study guide created by the UUA to guide our consideration of this critical issue. We also encourage everyone to share any books, films, and other resources that will help us continue this work in the coming year.

Rachel Somers Grant Award

Each year, the Rachel Somers Grant Award (http://www.uucantonny.org/pages/35/15/social-action-award) is presented to a member of the community whose life and work follow Rachel's example of a citizen activism. The 2015 award will be given to Heather Sullivan-Catlin in recognition of her work on food insecurity and sustainability issues relating to climate change. She has served on the Garden Share Board and is currently the chair of the local 350 group associated with Bill McKibben's work on climate change. Last year she worked with her students on a comprehensive study of food insecurity in the North Country. We hope everyone will join us at the Sunday, June 14, service during which we will recognize Heather's work in our community in addressing critical social issues.

Harris, It's So Amazing!: A Book About Eggs, Sperm, Birth, Babies, and Families, by Robie H. Harris, as well as The Period Book, Updated Edition: Everything You Don't Want to Ask (But Need to Know) and What's Going on Down There?: Answers to Questions Boys Find Hard to Ask, both by Karen Gravelle. SOLARIZE CANTON

In March, our congregation, along with several other Canton organizations, provided letters of support for a grant application submitted to NYSERDA by members of Canton's Sustainability Committee to initiate a Solarize Canton campaign. We recently learned that Canton is one of 26 communities in the state selected to receive funding for a Solarize campaign, which the committee has begun to work on.

Solarize Canton will kick off in early June with a float in the Dairy Princess Parade, information table in the park, and a door-to-door campaign soon after. Information sessions with members of the Canton Sustainability Committee and selected installers have been tentatively scheduled for the morning of Wednesday, June 13, at the Canton Free Library and evening of Monday, July 18, at the UU Church. Please consider attending one of these sessions to learn how you can reduce your carbon footprint, save money on your electric bills, and sign up for an assessment of whether solar will work for your home. Solar installations in New York are very affordable because NYSERDA provides financial assistance and both the federal and state government offer tax credits for solar projects. These tax credits are set to expire by December 2016 so the time to go solar is now!
