IN THE INTERIM - REV. JOEL REPORTS

Starting in January, each member and friend of the UU Church of Canton will receive a phone call asking for suggestions about who should serve on the Search Committee for the church's next settled minister. In preparation for this call, I encourage each of you to think of two or three people in the congregation whom you regard as effective on a team and committed to the congregation as a whole. Self-nominations are welcome, too. The Church Council will use your suggestions to create a slate of nominees for the Search Committee. They will seek a balance of diversity and skills. Details about this process were described in the November newsletter.

Service on a Search Committee is a rich and powerful experience because as the committee members do this deeply spiritual work, they develop strong spiritual relationships. This committee also requires a significant time commitment for about 10 months – between 250 and 400 hours overall. For many of those months, the committee has weekly meetings for tasks like planning, consulting with the congregation, and initial phone interviews with prospective ministers. There are typically three weekends that require some travel in order to have in-depth conversations with potential candidates (the pre-candidating weekends). And when the Search Committee chooses a candidate, he/she will come to Canton for candidating week to interview with the entire congregation.

Representing your beloved community in the search for a great match of church and minister is a profound service to your congregation. In February, Carol Zimmerman and I will be (finally!) starting Chalice Circles. We invite you to join us in this journey of the spirit. We're starting two groups that will meet at the church; one will meet on 2nd Tuesdays at 7 p.m. and the other on 3rd Thursdays at 7 p.m.

Chalice Circles are a way to deepen our spiritual practices as Unitarian Universalists. They are small groups (10 people maximum) who meet monthly to share stories and personal journeys. The curriculum we will use, Heart to Heart, encourages us to listen deeply to each other and create together a shared space in which we feel empowered to speak from our hearts. We hope participants in our Chalice Circles will grow more rooted in the collective story of our community – that as we share our lives, our hearts and souls will grow in ways we can't yet imagine.

We're asking for a five-month commitment to participate in a Chalice Circle so each group has the time and consistency to develop the connections that enlarge us as humans. BUDGET & FINANCE UPDATE

Until I served on Church Council from 2006 to 2008 I had no real idea what it costs to fund our congregation to fulfill its mission in our community and beyond. The biggest share of our funding is our own pledges. And about 78% of our budget goes to pay for our employees' salaries and benefits.

At the end of one of my years on Church Council, when our projected budget for the next year showed a shortfall, we on Church Council voted to cut the Campus Outreach position. The next year, in the same situation, I was one of several people who stood in front at our worship service and asked those of us who were able to do so (including me!) to increase our pledge by a small percentage so we didn't have to make cuts that year. As I recall we raised enough additional pledge totals to balance our budget.

This is my second year as chair of our Budget & Finance Committee. This year we are again in a similar situation. Budget & Finance has reduced the proposed budget by \$7,000 based on the result of our Stewardship Committee's canvass. We have avoided cuts to our Religious Education program, building maintenance and utilities, Program Committee expenses, and Office Expense. Wider World contributions to the Unitarian Universalist Association and the St. Lawrence UU District are at 100% of Fair Share amounts.

For the second year in a row, we have included neither cost of living adjustments nor any raises in base pay for any of our employees.

The necessary Fund Raising Lines (Special Fund Raiser and Fair Share) to balance this reduced budget total \$16,763.

I know many of our members have pledged as much as their economic circumstances will allow. I also imagine there may be are others, like myself, who can reassess our situation and make some kind of an increase, whatever size we can afford. I have looked at my circumstances from a viewpoint of generosity and gratitude for what this UU Church of Canton has meant, and means to me. I have found that I can increase my pledge - not by an exorbitant amount, but by a few percentage points over my initial 2015 pledge. If a number of us can do likewise we can do together what we could not do alone. And isn't that what being a "congregation" means?

SOCIAL ACTION UPDATE Social Action Work Groups

Last June the UUA adopted a new Congregational Study/Action Issue on Escalating Inequalities:

"Challenging extreme inequality is a moral imperative. The escalation of inequality undergirds so many injustices which our faith movement is committed to addressing: from economic injustice to mass incarceration; from migrant injustice to climate change; from sexual and gender injustice to attacks on voting rights."

Here in Canton our congregation's Social Action Committee has been working on providing information and opportunities for action on the extent and impact of inequalities here in St. Lawrence County. We began with two large planning sessions, followed by a successful "Community Roundtable" on inequalities in access to safe housing and healthy food.

Our next step beginning early in 2015 is to form several work groups, composed of folks interested in exploring a specific issue in more depth. Each group's goal will be to make recommendations to the

committee and congregation on opportunities for education, advocacy, and service on their focus issue. We will also be looking for ways our church can network with others in the community working on these concerns.

The work groups will work rather independently and collaboratively, setting their own agendas, communication, and meetings. Even folks who may be away for some time in the winter are welcome to participate virtually. We hope everyone will consider joining one of these groups:

- Food insecurity and access, including mini-gardens or shared gardens
- Housing/energy/heating
- Health access and practices
