IN THE INTERIM - REV. JOEL REPORTS

I'm still learning about the North Country, and I'm especially curious about how to help you all do conflict well.

That may sound strange, but I want to talk with you about conflict. How to do it – because conflict, when done well, is healthy and useful. Much like it is in a marriage. So, for example, when I first meet with a couple who wish to marry, I always advise them to "have their fights." The most important behavior that predicts a successful marriage is how a couple fights. There is a strong correlation between how couples manage their conflicts and the long-term success of their marriages. Couples who have healthy, useful conflict have a strong tendency to have successful marriages. Couples who avoid conflict or push their conflict into high drama and inflammatory behaviors have a strong tendency for their marriages to fail. This single factor is, by far, the most important factor in the success of marriages.

How congregations manage their conflict is not the only important factor in their success, but it remains important. So this winter I'm starting a Chalice Circle that will use a discussion guide titled "Compassion and Restoration – One Small Group at a Time." It will meet on the third Wednesday of the month, here at the church, at 7:30 p.m. The group will meet for three months (or longer, if the group wishes), and it's important that participants be able to attend each gathering. About February

by Kay Montgomery February is not for the faint hearted, I think. It is so exceedingly ordinary, having neither the romance of spring nor the bravado of winter. And the ordinary is tough, it seems to me, demanding as it does not only endurance but imagination.

Okay so maybe this February isn't quite ordinary for the North Country and still has a bit of the bravado of winter, but there is also the sense of endurance. Enduring the cold temperatures, the lack of snow up to this point, the weight of winter clothes, and the long hours of darkness. With this endurance though, there is time to contemplate and space for imagination.

The Religious Education Committee is in the process of imagining what the curriculum will look like for the 2016-2017 year. A few members and I are currently reading *Think Orange* by Reggie Joiner to inspire us to think more deeply about family ministry. We are also imagining how the concept of theme-based ministry might influence the program. In addition, we are imagining how we can collaborate with the Plattsburgh and Saranac Lake churches to better serve our children and youth as part of our multi-site ministry initiative.

The new adult education program, Coffee, Conversation & More, a collaboration of the Social Action, Environmental Action, Library, Religious Education and Welcoming committees, is developing a schedule of engaging topics for our congregation. Our youth group is creating their annual service for February 28, and Joel and I are collaborating on an intergenerational service for early March. So although there is a heaviness to this endurance of February, there is also a sense of lightness (not to mention the literal return of more daylight) - a lightness to imagine the future spiritual growth in our church community. May this February with its sense of endurance allow you time and space to imagine your spiritual future, too.

UPDATE FROM THE SEARCH COMMITTEE

The Search Packets – Ours and Theirs Our "packet" for ministers-in-search is now fully online at <u>http://search.uucantonny.org</u> (If you need the password to view those "protected" sections, just ask. You can contact us at <u>search@uucantonny.org</u>.) It will also be posted on the Search Committee bulletin board in the social room.

The UUA sent us a list of ministers who were interested in us; we studied their packets (also online), and from that study we selected a list of ministers we wanted to interview. It's been another labor-intensive stretch for us; those ministerial packets contain links to the ministers' sermons, letters of recommendation, and lots and lots of information about their backgrounds, theology, experiences, etc.



The Process Next Step: Interviewing the "Explorers"

Jon came up with the term "explorers" to describe our interviewees, which seems better than calling them "pre-pre-candidates." We had a series of Skype interviews with those explorers; Kim arranged for a wonderful meeting room in SUNY Potsdam's new Performing Arts Center. If you're not familiar with Skype, it's an online application that allows the people talking to see each other, so it has great advantages over a phone call. Using a computer and a camera, the person we're talking to can see all of the committee at once. Erika made us huge name tags that sat on the table in front of each of us, which we understand was a great help to the ministers we were interviewing.

We asked each explorer the same set of questions. They asked us questions, based on what they've learned about us from our congregational record and our packet. We also had several "explorer-specific" questions, which helped us to clarify or delve further into information from their packet. This part was also labor-intensive, but very exciting for all of us. I think each of us is feeling the privilege you've bestowed on us to represent you in this important process.

Pre-Candidates

Following those calls, we decided which of the explorers we'd like to invite. Those four ministers then become "pre-candidates." Jenn and Rajiv have begun a series of calls to references. Pre-candidates will travel to this area and have a number of meals and meetings with the Search Committee. (Pete is keeping a close watch on our budget to ensure we don't overspend!) We'll then all travel to the "neutral pulpit" and hear them give the Sunday sermon. Pre-candidating will start in early February and continues into March. At the end of pre-candidating, if we have found "the right fit," we'll have a candidate!

We could use some **help** from a few volunteers during these visits. For the sake of confidentiality (see below), we'll be meeting in one of our homes. We would be very appreciative of offers to help prepare and deliver Friday dinners and Saturday lunches. Carol Pynchon has agreed to organize meal preparers and deliverers for us. Please contact her if you can help.

Communication and Confidentiality

As promised, the results of the Cottage Meetings and the Congregational Survey are now available online! There is too much information to put into this newsletter: go to the packet at

http://search.uucantonny.org; scroll down and under Our Congregation, click on "Survey and Cottage Meetings." Remember, you'll need the password, which you can get from any of us, by sending an email to the search address, or from our bulletin board. In addition to lots of data, Erika has created a video walk-through of the survey that our explorers have found helpful. We encourage our congregation members to check it out!

We still want to hear from you. Ask us questions and give us your thoughts. We've been so honored to have your support in this and that support has continued into your respectful treatment of the few (but important) parts that we must keep confidential. Thank you so much for that. The tight lid we keep on is primarily for the protection of the ministers in search. As in many types of job search, the current employers don't always know that their employee is looking for a new position!

COFFEE, CONVERSATION, & MORE!

Have you ever wished you had a regular opportunity to explore a variety of religious and social justice topics with other UUs? Have you found it difficult to attend such events in the evening due to distance or work and family obligations? Recently representatives from these church committees met to collaborate on an ongoing program of Sunday morning adult discussions and education to respond to these needs:

- Environmental Action Council
- Library Committee
- Religious Education Committee
- Social Action Committee
- Welcoming Committee

Each of these committees periodically holds discussion events on topics relevant to our UU principles, but all encounter barriers to scheduling and participation. Publicizing so many individual events becomes cumbersome. Room scheduling often encounters conflicts. Night events are sometimes poorly attended. Barriers to attendance also include childcare responsibilities and distance from church.

We agreed that a regularly scheduled program of events would provide ongoing opportunities for adults to interact with other UUs on a flexible but regular basis outside of the worship hour. It would likely en-

courage wider and more inclusive attendance at all of our events, with attendance likely to better reflect the diversity of ages and stages of life in our congregation. These Sunday activities would allow us all to get to know each other and to bring new folks into our church family more quickly. Each session would stand alone but be part of the series that would include a wide variety of topics related to our UU values.

Based on this discussion, we decided to go forward with a pilot run of Sunday morning "Coffee, Conversation, & More" events from January to May this year:

- The program will run on the 2nd and 4th Sundays from 9:15 to 10:15 a.m. in the Romer Room. Child-care available will be available.
- Individual committees will be responsible for specific sessions scheduled into the general calendar.
- Announcements of specific events topics will be provided each month in the newsletter, with weekly reminders in the e-news, and advance posting on the website. This regular publicity will help every-one plan to attend.
- The committee sponsoring a particular Sunday will take responsibility for preparing the coffee, getting volunteers to bring some sort of food, and arranging childcare with Carol Zimmerman.
- In May we will evaluate the pilot and make decisions about continuing in the fall.

The following sessions have been scheduled for February. We hope you will come have coffee and join in the conversation and more:

February 14: 2016: International Year of the Pulse (The What???)

These high-fiber and high-protein foods are versatile and beneficial to global food security and sustainability. This Sunday morning session is part of our Environmental Action Committees effort to share meaningful ways to reduce your personal and family emissions of greenhouse gas emissions.

February 28: Justice for North Country Farm Workers

"Dairy is king" is the saying in the North Country, but there is a hidden cost to our prized dairy products – the human cost to the laborers who milk the cows on many of the biggest farms throughout the area. In not a few cases, these workers experience long hours, few days off, little training, hazardous work conditions, and on occasion, wage theft, abuse, and retaliation when they protest. Farm workers across the state have been injured or even died due to hazardous work conditions. In the past year, we learned about two cases of workers in our region being beaten badly by their managers, with no consequences by the farm owners employing them. Join this conversation about helping our farm workers obtain more just and humane working conditions, and to find out what we can do to help fortify North Country's milk with *justice*!

NEWS FROM OUR LARGER ASSOCIATION OF CONGREGATIONS:

Unitarian Universalist congregations are interconnected through the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA.org). An additional layer is organized by "districts" within the UUA, and in recent years many in our district and national leadership have been working toward reducing the complexity in how our congregations relate to each other. Thus there will be a vote at the annual meeting of our district –the St. Lawrence District – to dissolve this district, but to preserve its work and resources through the regional structures of the UUA.

I believe this is a good change for our Association of Congregations. Districts were a very good structure for our congregations when they were formed in the 1960s, empowering nearby congregations to support each other directly. With the advent of the Internet and a lot of institutional successes since then, I believe the goals of creating the district structures have been met. We are, in many ways, closer to each other with a more global outlook and the immediacy of communicating through the Internet and social media. The resources that sustained the institutional structures of districts can be made available for the important work of supporting congregations, starting new congregations, and helping congregations create their own local "shared ministries."
