PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

A major objective for 2017 is to rethink the role of Church Council and to chart a path that allows us to evolve into a more strategic body. To this end, we are reading *Governance and Ministry* (2nd edition) by Dan Hotchkiss. This book addresses the many ways that church governance presents itself and the pitfalls of various governance styles. Thankfully, it goes on to explore some alternatives. As the author states, it is easy to identify how your current structure doesn't work; not so easy to identify how it might change. We have been discussing one chapter at each Council meeting for the last 3 months, and plan a more extensive analysis at our Council retreat scheduled for early February.

One especially noteworthy concept Hotchkiss proposes is the shared empowerment of congregations and governance bodies – it doesn't have to be a zero-sum proposition. I think we have been moving in this direction (consciously or unconsciously) during our most recent transition, and that it is a worthy goal. We will keep reading and I will keep you posted on what we discover.

With the new year comes some changes to Church Council. We welcome the return of Jon Montan following his Search Committee sabbatical. Julie Van Duyne is continuing with a new, full term and Kathy Wyckoff is back on Council having previously served about 10 years ago. Gwen Cunningham will be joining the group as Treasurer.

We say goodbye to Carol Gable, Heather Rousell, and Gary Hoose.

Carol took on the challenge of being our Treasurer during this transitional period and she has done a great deal of work compiling and streamlining our financial procedures.

Heather has been a warm and welcome presence, bringing a we-can-do-it spirit to all our work. We will miss her and her willingness to take on whatever needs doing.

Gary has reached his term limit and it is hard to let him go. He has been the institutional memory of the last 8 years, and has brought an openness and thoughtfulness to all our discussions. His voice will be missed around the council table.

I think many of us feel 2017 will be challenging in ways we can't quite articulate. There is a lot of uncertainty in the wider world. What is not uncertain is how grateful I am for all those who are willing to do the work, whatever it is, to keep our church community moving forward and meeting the challenges.

B&G NEWS

Winter is here; it's a challenging season for the B&G Committee. Using programmable thermostats to maintain a comfortable temperature inside allows us to keep an eye on our energy consumption. It's a balancing act. So we are reasonably warm on Sunday mornings, we begin warming up the sanctuary from 58 to 62 degrees on Saturday night at 11:15; and at 6:00 am on Sunday push temperature from 62 to 68. An issue with lack of heat in the Upstairs Room has been fixed. Water was added to the system to increase pressure and the radiator is now working. That said, that room will always be chilly (it is controlled by thermostat in the social room) so dress warmly. The sidewalk from the side entrance down to the back entrance ices over regularly due to the freeze-thaw cycle of snow on the west side roof. It is getting treated daily but will continue to be a problem area. Coming soon – new door handles for the upstairs bathroom that will indicate when the bathrooms are vacant or occupied. Women's March -- Sponsored by the Social Action Committee and spearheaded by several church members, North Country participation in the January 21 Women's March in Washington, D.C. will be robust – over 150 participants expressing their determination to resist the potential rollback of women's and all peoples' rights in the next administration.

More ways to be involved in social justice efforts – Anyone in the church community is encouraged to nominate an organization (local, national, or international) for a Social Action Shared Offering. In November 2016 we collected \$1,147 to support Hurricane Relief in Haiti. This kind of support and awareness is an important dimension of our social justice work.
