FROM OUR MINISTER

Yahweh, Yahweh Always pain before a child is born Yahweh, tell me now Why the dark before the dawn? -U2 (Irish rock band)

It is an existential prayer of sorts, asking the ground of existence (Yahweh is the Hebrew personal name for God) why there seems to be a pattern in life of newness and beauty only coming after pain and struggle. We must embrace darkness and pain knowing that pockets of freedom and joy will open up only after a struggle. Many of us, for various reasons, might be experiencing the dark dryness and the pain. Perhaps it is the death of someone close to us or it is the angst and uncertainty that comes with realizing our president is no longer Barack Obama.

Turning *in* to the pain instead of away may sound sadistic to some, but it is not. It is facing reality and life honestly. Those deep darker times can lead us to a profound sense of hope, peace, gratitude, and acceptance. Moments of dryness and pain can become reboots and resets if we can open up to them.

I don't know why this pattern of pain before birth and darkness before dawn exists. All I can say is that the dawn does come, babies are born, and joy will penetrate our lives once again. We will get through this, all of it, together.

PRESIDENT'S COLUMN

As one of so many around the world who participated in the Women's March, I have come home from Washington in a different place. To be among 400,000 people crowded together for hours immersed in a non-stop, positive vibe was astonishing. I did not anticipate how this would affect me. I rode the bus to DC with a kind of grim determination. I returned with a determined hopefulness, and a renewed faith in the fundamental goodness of people across our entire country.

The real work begins now, translating all that positive energy into constructive action. Get connected. Do one thing a week that advances your cause. Go to a meeting, make a call, encourage a friend to run for office, show up at a local march or demonstration. Don't hide your beliefs – talk about them, stand up for them, live them in plain sight.

Our church community will be walking this talk as we move toward hanging a Black Lives Matter banner from our bell tower. As I mentioned during the discussion after the service on January 15, our congregation has a long history of advocating for marginalized people. At the September Start-up gathering, we constructed a timeline of memorable events in our congregation's past. It was obvious how much this history of social action resonated for those present, and how important it was to continue engaging in this work.

The church will be hosting a panel discussion on Wednesday, February 22, to better understand the experiences of students of color in our community. We also continue to host SURJ (Showing Up for Racial Justice) meetings, the next one is scheduled for Wednesday, February 8 at 5:30. I encourage people to attend one or both of these events. The BLM (blacklivesmatter.com) and SURJ (showingupforracialjustice.org) websites are also valuable sources of information.

Sometimes we just want to close our eyes and turn away. It is easier. Every moment is not filled with the exhilaration many felt at the Women's March. But we are at a moment where we must keep our eyes wide open and turn toward the action. It will be harder and messier, a long slog through rough terrain. But it will be worth it. After all, if you close your eyes, you miss the good things, too.

Gilbert at AUUC: The Adirondack UU Community is hosting a workshop led by Rev. Richard Gilbert on Saturday, April 22, that will explore the intersection between social justice/action and spirituality in worship. All are invited, but RSVPs are requested by March 1 to allow space planning. A \$10 donation will help AUUC cover expenses associated with the workshop.

Rev. Gilbert has been an articulate and passionate advocate for social action throughout his career, including 32 years of ministry at First UU in Rochester. More recently, he has helped launch Interfaith Impact of New York State, whose mission is to work for the common good through progressive religions advocacy.

Rev. Gilbert will also deliver the Gould Lecture entitled "The Prophetic Imperative in a Messy World" during the St. Lawrence Spring Gathering at May Memorial, Syracuse, on Saturday, April 1. According to Gilbert, the election of 2016 has done more than upset the political world. For Unitarians and Universalists – and many others – it has challenged the soul. Its meaning is far more than political. There are also moral, spiritual, and religious meanings in what has happened and is happening. What are those meanings and what are we to do with them? Leonard Cohen has caught the spirit of the age in his phrase "broken Hallelujahs." While we may wonder what he meant, it is more important what that phrase may mean for us.

One of the main benefits of our Annual Book Fair is that it allows us to buy more books for the Max Coots Library! We have several new books that will be of interest to lay leaders and members of the congregation. These include *Turning Point: Essays on a New Unitarian Universalism* edited by Frederic Muir, *InterFaith Leadership: A Primer* by Eboo Patel and *The Call to Care: Essays by Unitarian Universalist Chaplains* edited by Karen Hutt. In addition, *Humanist Voices in Unitarian Universalism* edited by Kendyl Gibbons and William B. Murry, *Darkening the Doorway: Black Trailblazers and Missed Opportunities in Unitarian Universalism* by Mark D. Morrison-Reed and *Love Beyond God*, meditations by Adam Lawrence Dyer are now available.

We also have the graphic novel *March: Book Three* by Congressman John Lewis, Andrew Aydin and Nate Powell. This is not simply a "comic book," but civil rights leader John Lewis's own story of when he was chairman of the Student Nonviolent Coordinating Committee. *March: Book Three* picks up in the fall of 1963 and documents the events leading to the Selma to Montgomery marches; you don't need to have read the first two volumes to get the most out of this book. This is a story that is relevant for our times and an important one for people of all ages to study. This book made history in 2016 as the first graphic novel to receive the National Book Award.

Remember, the Coots Library is open just before and directly after service every Sunday. We welcome users of all ages. Be sure to drop in and check out what we have to offer.
