First off, I want to express my gratitude for the successful pledge drive. Thank you to everyone who pledged, who hosted and facilitated cottage meetings, and everyone who planned, canvassed, took notes, and dreamed. Since we exceeded our goal, we won't have to do any special fundraisers to meet our budget. I am so proud to be the minister of this congregation. It becomes apparent more and more how my ministry connects with all of you. Our shared ministry is moving forward together.

Speaking of ministry, Jan Hutslar, longtime member and former DRE here has passed the Ministerial Fellowship Committee (the national credentialing body that recognizes a candidate's accomplishments). She has requested that the UU Church of Canton ordain her. This is exciting news!

In our polity, our form of church governance, only a local congregation can set someone apart officially as a minister. The UUA provides a rigorous formation process for a candidate but they cannot do this. A congregational vote must be taken to ordain a new minister. In Unitarian Universalist ministry we call one of us, one of our own to rise up, to lead. We should be proud; we raised up a minister! I have no doubt Jan will go on to serve another congregation and our movement with wisdom and love. The ordination ceremony will be a grand celebration – for our congregation, for our community, and for our movement. A NOTE FROM JAN

I first came to the UU Church of Canton in 1998 when I moved to the area. That first week I immediately felt at home and welcome.

In 2002, when I took the job as Director of Religious Education here, I did not know how much it would change my life. In my years here, I fell in love with Unitarian Universalism and the power, strength, and quiet resilience of congregational life. Our ministers and the congregation encouraged my leadership and taught me how to be a minister.

For many years, I had felt a yearning, a whisper from within me for something I could not name. It had to do with the work of my deepest soul and it took time, life experiences, and the movement of spirit for me to understand it as a call to ministry. It unfolded slowly, revealing itself in small glimpses, as a singing heart; as a deepest knowing; as call.

I resisted.

I did not want to leave my life here. I was home here. And the call was leading me somewhere else. I resisted for several years, trying to ignore it, until somehow, I came to realize that it wasn't going to go away and that it was stronger and bigger than my love for this home, this place, this congregation and this community. With the love and support of the people here, I followed my call to seminary at Starr King School for the Ministry.

I graduated in May, was granted fellowship as a UU minister on December first, and am now preparing to go into search for a church. Unitarian Universalist ministers are ordained not by the denomination, but by a congregation. This congregation, the UU Church of Canton, has encouraged me and loved me and grown me into ministry, I would be incredibly honored if you would consider ordaining me as the Reverend Jan Hutslar.

2018 CANVASS A RECORDING-BREAKING SUCCESS


THANK YOU for your incredible generosity, making possible the good work we will accomplish together in 2018. This year's canvass was our most successful ever with over \$250,000 committed, surpassing our \$245,000 goal. Our collective response affirms our future direction; it provides Church Council with the confidence to move forward with revising our mission statement, celebrating 20 years as a Welcoming Congregation, and renewing this commitment, and expanding Our Whole Lives into a lifespan ministry. Our generosity has funded our commitment to being a Fair Share Congregation in 2018, eliminating the need for a separate drive in the spring.

THANK YOU to church members who hosted a Cottage Meeting, who facilitated a Cottage Meeting, and who canvassed individually, and to the Stewardship Committee for their dedication and efforts.

We are pleased to announce a final total of \$250,467 from 128 units. Additional highlights:

- † 11% increase in commitments over last year
- † 55 individuals participated in Cottage Meetings
- † 8 family units who have moved from the North Country committed \$8,650
- \pm average gift = \$1,972
- † 17 family units made commitments for the very first time totaling \$8,228
- † 58 family units increased their commitments by \$24,383 over what they gave last year
- † new commitments, increased commitments, and commitments from family units that gave in prior years but not last year totaled \$30,933
- † 29 family units maintained last year's giving level, totaling \$50,150
- † 35 members volunteered to make this year's canvass a success

Why all the statistics? Because from one year to the next circumstances change. People move away from the church – geographically or spiritually, people pass away, people experience a change in financial or health circumstance, or people have kids now in college. Our canvass takes everyone doing their part; new commitments from first-time donors, donors increasing contributions, donors who were not able to participate last year reactivating their giving, and donors maintaining their giving all working in harmony to achieve success. Thank you again for your incredible generosity.
