FROM OUR MINISTER The Power of Mission

"The sale of tobacco products is inconsistent with our purpose," explained the CEO of CVS Pharmacy some four years ago. Their mission, after all, is "helping people on their path to better health." CVS's broad mission directly affected how they were going to run their business. They decided to really take their mission to heart over and above profits. Now it is becoming standard that pharmacies do not sell tobacco products. Since then, cigarette sales have gone down nationally and many people may have quit smoking because of CVS's move. Having a mission and a vision for a group of people is powerful.

I believe we must do the same. Mission gives everyone a sense of who we are and what we are about. It can lead us to do powerful and innovative things. We must pay attention to our mission, which, of course, is a moving target at times. I think the process of rewriting ours will help clarify our vision and our next steps moving forward.

The important work of re-doing our 20-plus-year-old mission has already begun.



GUEST AT YOUR TABLE

Guest at Your Table (GAYT) is the annual fundraising event for the Unitarian Universalist Service Committee

(UUSC) and supports their work to promote human rights and advance social justice in the United States and around the world. The UUSC works with local grassroots organizations that are on the front lines of justice work in their communities. Projects this year range from coping with the effects of climate change in Papua New Guinea, to providing legal support to detained immigrant/refugee families from Central America, to advocating for the rights of queer immigrants both inside and outside of detention. By inviting the UUSC to be a guest at your table, you can support their work and that of our neighbors across the globe.



The Makerspace RE class is teaming up with the Social Action Committee to promote Guest at Your Table. The Makerspace class Skyped with a representative from the UUSC to learn about its work, and is encouraging everyone to take home a GAYT donation box for your kitchen table. The idea of the donation box is that each day, when you share a meal with your loved ones, you can add a few coins to share with the UUSC. This year's theme – small change makes big change – is a reminder that when we all give a little, we can accomplish a lot.

The GAYT collection will run until February 11 when boxes are to be returned. Also on that day, the Social Action Shared Offering will be taken for the UUSC. Cash gifts and checks memoed with SASO/GAYT will be combined with the change collected in the boxes to help the UUSC work for justice and human rights in the United States and around the world.
