FROM OUR MINISTER Claiming Universalism

I have been a part of three other UU churches: First Unitarian Society of Milwaukee, Unitarian Church North in Mequon, WI, and First Unitarian of Albuquerque, NM. All three are historically Unitarian churches and never fully embraced Universalist in their name. It was natural for me then to identify more with Unitarian side of things. I even once claimed that having Universalism in our name was bad for our brand--too many syllables. I experienced the Unitarian side of our faith to be a little more rationalistic, their buildings tend to have less color, and they shied away from religious language.

I am proud of serving this historic Universalist congregation and learning about the prominence of Universalism in New York State. Over the past year I have identified more with Universalism, which has led me to ponder, what is contemporary Universalism?

The 19th century version of Universalism could be summed up with statement, "God is Love." Universalism has changed over time to become even more, well, universal. Universalism informs our principles and sources most explicitly with the worth and dignity of every individual and embracing the wisdom of the world's religions. Universalism stresses the largest possible world outlook. But I think at the core of Universalism is love. There is a love that goes past division and difference.

There is a love that knows no boundaries. It is both mysterious and practical. It challenges us to think and be in new ways. Our Universalist heritage helps us see the other, the one that is different than us, with love. It is the highest of ideals. As we begin to think more about our commitment to being a Welcoming Congregation and our new mission statement, it important to recognize the Universalism that is in and around us.

To this end we had a mini workshop on Friday, February 9. The Reverend Christine Robinson lead close to 50 church members in a few interactive exercises to help us articulate what is precious and important about this church.


In small groups, each person answered the question "What would you miss if this church wasn't here?" These comments were condensed into statements and written on large post-it sheets. Then, armed with three dots per person, we placed our dots next to the statements that were the most meaningful to us (these sheets are hanging on the wall to the right of the fireplace in the social room).

Here are the statements that garnered the most dots:

Create a deeper sense of connection with each other and something greater than ourselves (10) Energize ourselves to affect social change (10) Foster free thinking for adults and children in the church and community (9) Celebrate inclusivity in a multi-generational community (7) We'll keep these sheets up for a while.
