retreat from the extreme battles of our time. In October I went to a UU minister's retreat in Hamilton, New York. It was good to see colleagues and talk ministry. More importantly, it was good to just retreat. You may wonder what ministers do on retreat. We worship together. We had a business meeting. This year we focused on spiritual practices.



We need times of retreat.

What amazed me most is the same thing that amazes me about this congregation: a deep commitment to Unitarian Universalism.

We all need places and spaces in which to retreat. Whether it is the



ritual of running or reading - we all need to time to draw back, to be called back from the battle lines of life.

Last thing, I beg of you, I plead with you, get out there and vote!


