I got to spend some one-on-one time with the poet, lawyer, formerly incarcerated, and all-around brilliant person Dwayne Betts after his keynote address. I found out we have some things in common. We both have a son named Miles and both love basketball and books. He said something that will stick with me for a long time.

"It is great that your church is bringing the community together on an issue like this." "It was really just a lot of networking" I deflected. "We don't agree on theology, but we all agree on social justice."

"But still, churches don't normally do this sort of thing. There are no churches where I live that would do this. If there was, I would want to be part of it." Dwayne added.

Within me arose a feeling I seldom experience. I wish I knew the word for it. The feeling recalled times when I got arrested for protesting on a military base, times when I volunteered at a homeless shelter, and moments in worship. I felt like I was right where I was supposed to be. There I was being nudged out of my comfort zone and recognizing it. I moved into something beyond "me". It was a very good feeling, a complex feeling of fulfillment that I want more of. In short, my faith expanded, my faith grew.

Before that conversation, I was so caught up in the conference itself, trying to make sure things went well, not seeing the bigger picture. We did bring a bunch people together for a cause beyond ourselves. We are a community church committed to social justice.

Thank you to all that attended, planned, and worked hard to make *Justice For All* a faith expanding experience.

SAFETY COMMITTEE NEWS

Over the past year, the Safety Committee has been doing a broad assessment of the safety and security needs of our church facility. We are happy to report that these assessments have led to the implementation of several improvements to our building safety and security protocols.

Last March, ten people in our congregation were trained and certified in the use of CPR/AED. As a result of that initiative, we have purchased and will be installing an AED, (Automatic Electronic Defibrillator), to have available, should the need arise.

Another need that was identified, was that we needed to better understand our fire protection/emergency response. To that end, the committee identified and mapped all of the fire alarm stations, fire extinguishers, exits, security lighting and fire drill/evacuation policies as well as gaining a better understanding of what the fire department response services actually cover. As it turned out, the Canton Fire Department has very specific and defined and limited response protocols.

In response to those findings, in February, the committee hosted a seminar, led by Alan Mulkin, the Chief of SUNY Canton University Police on the subject of safety and security in public facilities. After many months of discussion at the committee and church council levels, we determined that our emergency response systems

were narrowly focussed on fire events. As a result of those discussions, the decision was made to augment our fire alarm and notification system with a companion system for the purpose of law enforcement notification. Both systems are provided to us by NCC Systems. If you have any questions about either of our alarm notification systems and procedures, please see Todd Moe, John Danis or Rev. WORSHIP COMMITTEE Hearing Assist Reminders

Our church tries to make it possible for everyone to hear the worship services. Toward this end, we have five portable hearing assist units with earpieces that are to be found every Sunday morning in a little labeled box near the Social Room entrance to the Sanctuary. These work by picking up a radio signal from our sound system and amplifying it. The user can adjust the volume. Many people are aware that these are available, but some may not know that we also have two "neck loops" for people who have hearing aids with a T-coil setting. The way these work is that the user unplugs the earpiece jack and plugs in the neck loop jack. The neck loop transmits the wireless signal directly to the hearing aid. If you have such a hearing aid and would prefer to

The first two events will be Sundays, November 3 and December 8. We will start with the Current State of the Climate in November to solidify our understanding of the issue. In December we will discuss How to Engage with Alternative Viewpoints. This is intended to be especially useful for those connecting with relatives over


the holidays who may deny, dismiss, or downplay climate change, but certainly has broader applications as well.

Campus Kitchens Project: We are developing a more robust connection with the student-run Campus Kitchens program based at St. Lawrence University.
