I am already starting to brainstorm: the older couple a street over with whom I always have deeper conversations, the young family I met in Potsdam who said they attended a church but it was too conservative, and the family I recently met that is new to town and looking for community. I am going to invite all of them personally and send them a little card in the mail.

Last year during 'Invite a Friend Sunday' I met 9 visitors. I invited my neighbor and she came! Our children and youth invited friends, too. It is a simple reminder that we grow by inviting people with whom we have a relationship.

Inviting people we know to join us for Sunday worship does two things: It grows our faith and our congregation. It identifies us as spiritually minded people who are grounded in community. I find that talking about matters of faith, which can be difficult, helps us grow personally. If we want to grow our larger faith and grow the congregation, we need to talk about our faith. 
COFFEE, CONVERSATION & MORE Hosted by the Climate Action group. Sunday, February 9 at 9:15 a.m.

Implications of and military preparation for a changing climate

Our military recognizes that their operations will be significantly impacted by changing climate. The most recent 2019 Army War College report's second sentence spoke of the Department of Defense as being "precariously unprepared" to meet the challenges of climate change-induced national security threats. It said rising seas will displace "tens, if not hundreds, of millions of people." It wondered where the people nearest the ocean in already over-crowded Bangladesh will go. It describes the Army as being "precariously close to mission failure" in meeting the hydration needs of troops in hot and arid places. The presentation and discussion will be led by Ginger Storey-Welch.

Ginger is a member of our congregation and the chair of NC350, the local community climate action group. She worked with an SLU intern to prepare this presentation. In addition to leading this discussion, she will provide a brief video to recap the key points to share with all of us.

The CC&M venues provide us with an opportunity to learn, share our own concerns and ideas, and take action. Join us at this event or during social hour to write postcards to congress to urge them to take note of the numerous DoD studies that address the challenges of climate change. Our military needs to be prepared.

Social Action is Evolving. As we continue to work on integrating the social justice work of our congregation, the Social Action Committee has been discussing its role. The enormity of concerns in the world is daunting and overwhelming. How can one person, or one committee, make a difference, and how long will it take? Beginning last year, we tried a different approach. Small groups of individuals with shared interests agreed to form working groups for a year. Currently, the three most active working groups or "Action Circles" are the

Climate Action Group, the Campus Kitchens Support Team and the LGBTQ+ Group, and others are gaining momentum.

In addition to the project-oriented Action Circles, we propose establishing the "Faith in Action Leadership Group" that will work with our Social Justice Coordinator to support and coordinate emergent and on-going efforts while continuing to attend to our congregation's long-standing commitments to social justice, such as selecting recipients for the Rachel S. Grant Social Action Award or Social Action Share Offerings. From nurturing a new generation of leaders to explaining the nuts-and-bolts for organizing an event at church to holding the big picture and institutional memory of social justice work in our congregation, the Faith in Action Leadership Group hopes to involve, coordinate, inspire and lead. We think these are good ideas, but we know we haven't thought of everything and welcome suggestions, questions, or ideas for new Action Circles as we embrace our 6th Principle: The goal of world community with peace, liberty and justice for all.



Continuing Our Commitment: Gathering of Action Circles. Members of current Action Circles and all who are curious are invited to join us **after church on February 16**. Participants will share progress reports on what they have accomplished this year and thoughts about where they could use some additional help. We will also seek input on the proposed evolution of social justice efforts described above. A light lunch will be provided. Learn More About the 2020 Census – It's Important!! We are joining forces with the League of Women Voters to co-sponsor a presentation by Census Bureau Partnership Specialist Nicole Jordan on Thursday, February 6th, at 7 p.m. at the church. The census **determines not just congressional representation**, but **also federal funding** to support essentials that New Yorkers use every day, including funding for housing, highways, transportation, food stamps, and education. Based on the 2010 census, New York receives about \$73 billion

a year and the 2020 census will influence policymaking and planning for the next decade. After the last census in 2010, New York State lost two seats in Congress, reducing its delegation in the House to 27 members. An undercount in 2020 could result in more losses in representation in Washington. The presentation is geared for organizations and agencies to do outreach to their clients to ensure a full and complete 2020 Census count. Join us to learn more!
