JAMES' JOURNAL Spirit in Action

My German Lutheran roots run deep. My great grandfather, Wilhelm, spent his life as the sexton at St. Jacobi, the church and school I attended. My grandfather, Gerhardt, dead for 20 years now yet with whom I still feel a deep connection, often picked me up early on Sundays and drove me to church. Then afterwards he rewarded me with breakfast at a Greek diner. While eating eggs and bacon, my

grandfather told me that church is not entertainment. Church should be solemn and calming. For him, feelings were an afterthought, something to be controlled and stamped down. We may have talked about the Holy Spirit but even that was more of a cognitive concept, not something to be experienced.

Now, there are many things I take away from being raised Lutheran, including hymn singing and a love of scripture, but spirituality is not one of them. Spirituality can best be summed up with the positive emotions – joy, trust, love, hope, gratitude, awe, and compassion... and maybe a few others.

Hearing a Lutheran gospel choir, which may sound like an oxymoron, in my high school chapel was life-changing. The joy of gospel music, even if you are not a believer, is felt deep within. Hearing and then being part of a gospel choir caused me to feel the joy that my religion of origin only discussed. Religion and emotion became one.

I think Unitarian Universalism specifically, and really all religions, should try to elicit and evoke the "good" emotions. Exalting and meditating on the positive emotions gives us long-term spiritual health and empowers us to do something about the state of the world. And when we do something, get out of cognition and act on our hope and compassion, we actually get flooded with unspeakable spirit.

The Social Action Committee has been restructuring itself to make it easier to get involved – to put our positive emotions, our spirituality, our faith, in action. The exciting specifics are contained lower in this newsletter.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE Caring Circle Generosity Touches Many

For many years a circle of volunteers at our church has stepped up to provide just the kind of helping hands Carole King sings about. The Caring Circle is there for members and friends requiring various kinds of short-term assistance. In 2019, close to 100 Caring Circle volunteers were on call to respond to about 120 requests for help from church friends.

Caring Circle volunteers provide transportation to church, doctor and dental appointments, and even an occasional ride to the drug store or babysitting stint so a tired parent can get some rest. Throughout the year meals are prepared and delivered to individuals and families recovering from illness and adjusting to the birth of a new child.

Caring Circle volunteers planned, organized, and hosted six memorial service receptions in 2019. When calls go out for sympathy and get well cards, volunteers eagerly respond, providing recipients with important support from their church community.


CELEBRATION OF HOLI Sunday, March 22, 3-5 p.m.

FAITH IN ACTION

Breaking News: The Social Action Committee is transforming!

We are very excited to share the latest in our transition to a social justice model that empowers more community members to get involved. Like an upgrade to our systems, our church will be able to support more actions and events, with more people getting involved on their own terms!

Our Social Justice Coordinator, Teresa, will be partnering with the new Faith in Action Leadership Group (formerly known as the Social Action



Committee) to tend to recurring events like SASOs and issues requiring urgent response. Our other main priority will be supporting the development of Action Circles, where members of the community can take action to address what matters most to them.

What's an Action Circle?

Action Circles are groups of at least three committed people who wish to organize events, trainings, actions, and/or ministry around specific issues. Currently the church supports three very active Circles: Poverty in the North Country, Climate Action, and LGBTQ+ Action. Two Action Circles that would like more members are organizing around Immigration and Prisoner Support.

How do I start an Action Circle?

You and two friends make a commitment to organize for a specific period of time (one to 12 months), then reach out to your Social Justice Coordinator, Teresa Veramendi, and we will get you started!

Social Action Shared Offering (SASO)

The Federation of Parents and Friends of Lesbians and Gays (PFLAG) began in 1973 to create a supportive space for parents with gay and lesbian children. By 1982, members had created a national organization and a non-profit. In 1998, PFLAG added transgender people to its mission and in 2014, the organization officially changed its name to simply "PFLAG," to accurately reflect all the members, communities served, and the inclusive work PFLAG has been doing for decades.

PFLAG has established over 400 local chapters across the nation, offering support through online learning programs, advocacy and media training, scholarships, and publications helping to generate safe schools, support LGBTQ+ pride celebrations, and provide ally training.

As part of the UU Church of Canton's Welcoming Congregation Renewal program, we are also working to create a more inclusive environment for transgender folks living in the North Country.

The Social Action Shared offering on March 29, 2020, will benefit PFLAG at the national level and help the congregation honor International Transgender Day of Visibility on March 31. Both the discrimination against and contributions from transgender people worldwide are usually made invisible, we will be lifting these voices up.

In 1997, a local PFLAG chapter was founded by members of our church as part of our first Welcoming Congregation initiative. For nearly 20 years, chapter members did solid, pioneering advocacy work. The LGBTQ+ Action Circle is starting a new PFLAG chapter to resume this valuable work. If you would like to become a PFLAG member, and/or help organize the new chapter let us know! CLIMATE CRISIS ACTION CIRCLE

It's Easy Being Green!

Climate change acknowledgement and green living practices go together. Rather than feel overwhelmed by the enormous impact of the facts and photos we see of planetary changes, our climate crisis action circle will be offering helpful weekly tips which we can all implement in our homes and daily practices. Let's do our part to save energy, reduce waste, and treat the earth like a dear friend.

Look for tips in our weekly enews that look like this:

It's Easy Being Green!

Wash your clothes in cold water and hang them on the line for solar energy to do the work, or hang them inside to provide extra humidity to the dry air in your house during the long cold winter.

The Climate Crisis Action Circle had another great **Coffee Conversation & More** in February. Ginger Storey-Welch shared her well-cited work understanding the US military's perspectives and preparedness for a changing climate. She left us with a few key messages and information to share with our elected officials to help to assure that our military personnel are prepared and safe.

Key Points:

- The Defense Department has written numerous reports defining their concern and need to prepare for a changing climate. Retired leaders are especially vocal with their concerns.
- One report indicated that they are "precariously unprepared for national security implications of climate change-induced global security problems" (link to report)
- Over 50 military installations are vulnerable to current and future coastal flooding, with repair and restoration costs in the billions of dollars for each extreme weather event (link to report)
- Exposure to high temperatures and dry conditions will threaten our troops' health
- The current federal government has dismantled a Navy task force on climate change just before its final report was completed

Call to Action: Rep. Elise Stefanik (202-225-4611) is on the Armed Services Committee and chairwoman of the House Armed Services' Subcommittee on Emerging Threats and Capabilities. Please call to:

- Express your concerns about climate change and the immediate need to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions
- Express your concern about politics trumping science in our current response to all climate threats
- Indicate that you are concerned about the emerging threat of climate change to our national security and health of our troops
- Ask her why the findings of military reports are not prominently available and placed on a higher priority within the DoD
