As we lament our summer plans, grieve all the losses of life, and realize the uncertainty of not knowing when things will become normal again, it is very easy to become depressed. In fact, I think it is perfectly natural to feel spiritually dry right now. We do not have the flowing waters of normal life to quench our thirst. As dis-

ruptive as this pandemic is, we are keeping our virtual front doors open to this moment in history and all the change it lures us into.

I have to admit I never Tweeted in my life. I am not sure what TikTok is, and I have never used Instagram. I sit sometimes comfortably but mostly awkwardly in the digital world. I like granite and brick churches and wood pulpits. But I now have a YouTube Channel and own a teleprompter, a fancy microphone, video editing software, and a lighting system that makes my home office look more like a newscaster's than a minister's.

The Communications Committee has been moving us in a digital direction for some time now. They have been using Facebook and created a wonderful website among many things. But I have often thought, "It is great they are doing 'those things' but I will keep doing my ministry as I always have." WORSHIP COMMITTEE Church Participation via Video and/or Audio

It has been terrific that so many people, both physically near and far away, have been participating in church services and activities via the Zoom video conferencing software! We acknowledge that this is a bit of a learning curve for many and will try and steer you to instructional materials and/or answer questions directly if you want to get the most out of the experience. One important note is that if you want to participate via phone only, make sure your phone plan allows for "unlimited" long-distance calling, as the Zoom phone contact number is a long-distance call.

During services on Sunday the hosts of the Zoom session mute participants, except those who have speaking, singing, or musical roles. We must do this to avoid potential audio chaos when approximately 100 people are participating. When we go into Social Hour via the breakout rooms after a service, we unmute all participants.

MONEY MATTERS Church Council Financial Report

As of now, the church's financial position continues to be strong, but as with most things these days, there is uncertainty about the future. Church Council and the Budget & Finance Committee discussed and approved applying for funds via the Paycheck Protection Program (PPP). As you may have read in the news, the first round of PPP funding has been fully allocated so we're now waiting to find out if and when there will be another round. If this does occur and if churches are still eligible, we are prepared to submit an application very quickly.

The previous rules of the program would allow us to apply for two months of payroll expenses as well as funds to cover rent/mortgage and utility payments. Because we are lucky enough to own our building and our utility expenses are fairly low, we planned to limit our request to the amount needed for payroll for two months (approximately \$25,000.) This funding comes technically in the form of a loan from the Small Business Association, but according to the previous guidelines, as long as the funds are used for the aforementioned purposes and within eight weeks of approval, it will be 100% forgiven.

At the of this writing we still aren't sure what the rules will be for the next chapter of the stimulus package and it is difficult to know if our application will be approved, but Church Council and Budget & Finance feel strongly that if the opportunity arises again, it is a way for the church to offset potential losses of income from pledges and other revenue streams such as the weekly offering and building use fees. This program is especially appropriate as it would help us protect our church's most valuable asset, our amazing and dedicated staff!

A New Way to Donate

venmo

Please consider using <u>Venmo</u> to make your contribution to the virtual collection plate during the Sunday Zoom service.

Venmo is a simple and convenient payment program using an app on your cell phone or other device. It is a free service when you use a debit card or direct payment from a bank account. It is completely secure, and the church is already equipped to accept payments this way.

After setting up your account it is easy to make a payment. Simply select the church as the recipient (the church's username is UU Church Canton), add the amount, and press PAY. This method has the added advantage of not interrupting the service.

Venmo is quick and easy and can be used for the Sunday morning offering and other payments to the church.

BUILDING & GROUNDS

The NY PAUSE order has required the B&G Committee to meet via Zoom to adjust our normal way of seeing to the needs of our building and grounds.

Our custodian, Rick Facey, is deep cleaning the building. He has already cleaned and disinfected the RE class-rooms and main space. This has involved removing contents from the cabinets for a thorough cleaning, washing walls, and stripping and refinishing the no-wax floors. Rick took extra care to clean hard-surface toys, blocks, etc. in the nursery. He will be making his way through the rest of the building and if the PAUSE order continues, he will paint the Romer and Social Rooms.

Our annual spring work day has been cancelled but we are fortunate that Arianna Whittaker, our summer youth worker, has agreed to start working now. Our priority is raking, weeding, edging, and mulching the front and west side of our grounds. Locke Design and Build will begin lawn mowing in a few weeks. Miles Manchester and Ben Hunkins are coordinating efforts for growing vegetables in the Priest Garden.

Our goal is to have our building clean and our grounds looking beautiful when the green light is given to resume regular activity.

Outside of church Sheila was a swimming instructor in the public schools and she substitute taught Earth Science. She raced in international sailing competitions. In 1968 she became the first woman on the Potsdam Rescue Squad. Sheila lives in Potsdam, attends church regularly, and is often the first person in line for coffee at social hour.

CHURCH AND COMMUNITY PROGRAM

The Church and Community Pantry welcomes our regular customers and new customers looking for some relief in their food budgets at this coronavirus time. Our service area includes people from the towns of Canton, Clare, Hermon, DeKalb, and Russell. The Pantry has a lot of good, nutritious food available (including fresh produce and frozen meats). Our new prepackaged box distribution is quick and easy. People just knock on the entry door behind our building at 7 Main Street in Canton. If you are new to the pantry, it would be helpful to call ahead (315 386 3534). A volunteer will bring a big box or two (depending on family size) of food to your vehicle.

Our new (COVID) hours are noon to 3 p.m. on Wednesdays. We just added a satellite distribution center at the United Methodist Church on US 11 in DeKalb Jct. from noon to 2 on Thursdays in case people are over that way or if Thursday is more convenient for them.

Please note that our thrift shop at the front of the building is closed until shopping restrictions are lifted.
