FROM OUR SOCIAL JUSTICE COORDINATOR

In this time of great upheaval, there is so much we can do to create positive change, on both small and large scales. This month, I invite you to take a deeper look at The Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival (PPC). The Unitarian Universalist Association "is an official endorser and faith partner of the Campaign because we align with the goals, strategies, and tactics that strengthen multi-faith and partner relationships and coalitions, deepen our own faith, and help build a transformative movement for justice."



On June 20, PPC held one of the largest digital justice gatherings in history, with over 2 million people tuning in to our Mass Poor People's Assembly & Moral March on Washington, with incredible testimony offered from around the country in a well-curated and informative event still available for viewing online. I learned so much about how poverty intersects with race, gender, sexuality, immigration, health, education, climate change, militarism, voting rights... It was a very transformative and awakening offering! I implore you to watch it, even if you only watch a part of the whole.

As a result of this successful event, the campaign is growing all across the USA, including in the North Country! Check us out at facebook.com/groups/northcountryppc. I am on the leadership team as part of my work at our church and it has never been easier to get involved with the campaign. Every month we hold an organizing meeting on Zoom on the third Tuesday at 6-8pm. Our next meeting will be on August 18th. We have also been organizing monthly outdoor forums in response to Black Lives Matter around the North Country. Currently, we are writing letters to New York State officials to ask about COVID-19 precautions being taken in upstate prisons to protect public health, as well as preparing for our participation in St. Lawrence County's reforms of local police departments.
