JAMES' JOURNAL Abrupt Sunstroke

I went on a hike with my family at Indian Creek Nature Center during the late March heat wave. Highs were in the 60s. The last time it was that warm in Canton...maybe October?

When we left our home it was about 40 degrees and I was wearing black gloves and a knit hat. The air was clear and blue and the sun was bright and hot. The moon was prominent high above, seemingly close. Despite all that heat, the large marsh was still frozen. My European ancestors did not genetically prepare my skin for this day. I got sunburned and a slight sunstroke. My skin is not used to drastic transformation. Gradual transition is much preferred.

The pandemic has been an abrupt change that we couldn't be prepared for, and part of being unprepared is getting burned. The pandemic seems to be easing and turning as more and more people are getting vaccinated. But there is still so much uncertainty. I hope it is a slow change back to "normal." We have been changed and shocked into new ways of being. Can we ever go back to the way things were? Once we participate in the shocking change of sunburn and heat-stroke, we must remember to wear hats and sunblock and carry a water bottle. As our spirits fill with the hopes of life opening up again. We must stay alert, be smart, and remain prepared for our mutual fragility.

All seasons are a process. All of life is a process of becoming. The process of spring is full of glory but it can take you by surprise. This pandemic can do likewise.

In my early 20s, I worked in retail, specifically outdoor retail. I was the buyer for a small privately owned store. I got to travel to buying shows, spend large sums of money, and work six days a week. A young woman's dreams come true. There were downsides too. The week before Christmas I always seemed to get sick with a bad cold or the flu. I would spend Christmas day trying to recover from weeks of work. I took pride in my work and yet I felt I was following a path that wasn't right for me.

I left that work and became an outdoor educator (read my March article for part of that story). I found the work of teaching and being outdoors so rewarding and soul filling. My work as an educator has taken many paths as I have grown older. Teaching outdoor education in summer camps, universities and local school districts. Teaching the eight dimensions of wellness – emotional/mental, environmental, financial, intellectual, occupational, physical, social and spiritual wellbeing – at local work sites.

FROM OUR SOCIAL JUSTICE COORDINATOR

Alongside the sunshine, hope for justice has peeked out over the horizon in the past few weeks. One source of hope for me is the newly founded New York UU Justice network, and their selection of the campaign to #HALTSolitary in NY as one of their three areas of focus this year. Another source of hope is that #HALTSolitary legislation was passed in the NYS Senate and Assembly on March 18! All that is left is for Governor Cuomo to sign it. We must call and write letters NOW to ensure this happens.



Before I came into contact with the #HALTSolitary campaign in the North Country, I had no idea that the UN had declared solitary confinement beyond 14 days to be torture. I also had no idea that the average stay in solitary confinement in a NYS prison is 70 days. This issue has grown as prisoners who have COVID-19 are put into solitary confinement to isolate them from others (which has led to prisoners underreporting symptoms). I also didn't know that ending solitary in NYS would save \$132 million a year! Everything you need to know about this legislation, and the materials to help you contact the Governor can be found on nycaic.org.








Our church has historically relied on the generosity of a few individuals to raise the funds needed for our annual operating budget. The Stewardship Committee has been working for a number of years to reach a more equitable distribution of donations, with limited success. This year, the pledges of 14 households accounted for 50% of our canvass total, while 114 households pledged the remaining half.
