THE REV. JAMES' JOURNAL

In the Unitarian Universalist tradition, clergy are expected to take regular sabbaticals. Just as a field should lie fallow for a season every few years, and thus be replenished in nutrients, both the minister and congregation need sabbaticals so they might return restored and rejuvenated. A sabbatical is especially needed in the changing and high-anxiety environment of the current pandemic. Congregational experts recommend that sabbaticals occur on a regular basis. Ministers who take regular sabbaticals have longer and healthier ministries. When a minister is renewed in spirit they are able to minister more fully and compassionately. I view my sabbatical as a great privilege and I am very grateful to be able to have one.

The collective memory of our congregation may not even recall the last ministerial sabbatical. The Revs. Anne and Wade took a short one back in 2007.

While I am on sabbatical, I will not be involved in the church except in the most extraordinary circumstances. I will not preach, counsel, plan, supervise others, recruit, answer emails, make decisions, teach, or perform special services. I will, instead, be spending the time renewing my ministry and working on projects and skill development that cannot happen as well during the regular course of his leadership. The focus of my sabbatical will be to improve my writing and to write enough poetry and meditations to be able to submit to a publisher, Skinner House Press, for their inSpirit series.
