Emergency and crisis management, licensed counseling, or therapy. While our Pastoral Care Team is trained and willing to help in any way they can, they are not equipped to handle emergency situations or urgent crises that require the knowledge of licensed professionals. They can guide you to resources that will be of help, though.



## How to obtain pastoral care:

You can call the church at 315-386-2498 or email <u>dre@uucantonny.org</u>. Carol Zimmerman, our Director of Religious Education, will then connect you with a member of our Pastoral Care Team. Or you are welcome to contact someone on the team directly. Please note: the telephone and email are monitored daily, but not every hour. It could take 24 to 48 hours for a response as we receive the message and find the right response for your situation. If you find yourself in an emergency situation, please contact Reachout at 315-265-2422 or dial 911.



- Be respectful of those around you


