Being an ever curious and imaginative child, I opened the toolbox next to the seat and found a large flat head screwdriver. I inserted the screwdriver into the ignition of the tractor and gave it a turn. To my and my dad's amazement, the tractor turned over, rumbling to a start and starting to move forward. I don't think I have

ever seen my dad run so fast. Needless to say, I was immediately removed from the tractor seat and told never to do that again. I remember seeing fear in my dad's eyes and feeling shocked, scared, and a bit powerful. I had started the tractor all by myself!

This story has stuck with me. My curiosity awakened a new knowledge of what I could do if I put my mind to something. As Unitarian Universalist, we are invited to be curious. To question, to search for truth and meaning, and to be open minded. Being curious is crucial for continued growth. Curiosity awakens us and allows us to be open to new ideas, knowledge, experiences, interests, hobbies, adventures, and - most importantly - to other people. What piques your curiosity these days? BUILDING & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

Does the lighting in church seem brighter? The church took advantage of a program offered through National Grid to convert 77 existing fluorescent light fixtures in the Social Room, Romer Room, kitchen, Coots Library, office, nursery, youth group room, music room, RE classrooms, block room, furnace room, and basement restroom. National Grid contributed \$2,600 while the church's cost was \$1,536. The LED tubes are guaranteed for five years. If any burn out, National Grid will replace them at no charge.

This spring-summer Locke Design & Build will complete stone tuck-pointing of trouble spots on the west facing-side of church and install a channel drain at our back entrance.

May spring clean-up day TBA soon. We were not able to hold our annual spring clean-up work party in 2020 and 2021. It's time to get the work gloves on, grab shovels, rakes, brooms, weeding tools, and buckets for some overdue ground's work and cleaning of interior and exterior windows. Stay tuned for announcement of date, time, and details.

FAITH IN ACTION

Join in the planning for our next Social Justice Initiative

After a hiatus during the covid pandemic, the Faith in Action Committee is excited to begin planning our next Social Justice Initiative.

The Social Justice Initiative (SJI) is a biennial program to raise awareness about important problems we face in our communities, with particular focus on the UU Principles of "justice, equity, and compassion in human relations" and "a free and responsible search for truth and meaning." Each SJI focuses on a specific social justice issue and brings together people from across our region to make connections, share information and resources, and develop strategies for addressing the issue. Previous SJIs have focused on systematized imprisonment in the North Country (2019) and harassment and bullying in workplaces (2017).

SJI activities center around us hosting a regional conference along with presenting workshops, educational activities, and arts events. These events bring together various facets from within our congregation and foster connections with the community beyond our congregation. The SJI is made possible by a gift from the family of Paul Siskind and Todd Moe, along with support from our UU Church and the larger UU community.

The FiA Committee will soon be sending out a survey to solicit ideas for the topic of our next SJI and to invite participation in the SJI planning process, so start thinking about issues that you would like us to consider, and keep your eyes open for more info in the near future.

s Canton area farmers gardeners plan their vegetable patches for spring planting, the Church and Community Program is asking them to consider planting an extra row to have fresh produce to share with the local food pantry.

"Each year, our local farmers and gardeners are generous with providing fresh



produce, which makes a world of difference," says Church & Community Program Director Connie Jenkins. "This year there is a special need, as the large supply of vegetables that had come from Ogdensburg Correctional Facility's garden will not be available, as the prison has closed."

The food pantry has access to food basics from the regional food bank, local contributions, and other sources, but fresh vegetables and fruits are harder to come by. Pantry families are absolutely delighted when there is fresh produce, Jenkins noted.

Salad makings, including lettuce, tomatoes, peppers, and cucumbers, are welcome, along with vegetables that keep well, such as onions, carrots, and butternut and acorn squash.

When families go berry or fruit picking, picking an extra amount to bring to the pantry makes for a true treat. "Faces light up when we have strawberries or fresh fruit," Jenkins said.

COVID SAFETY POLICY

Church Council has decided to follow the guidance of the CDC and their determination of Covid risk level by county.

- When St. Lawrence County is deemed HIGH RISK by the CDC, masks will be required by all persons in the church and shared food and drink will be prohibited.
- When our county is at MEDIUM or LOW RISK, masks become optional and food and drink will be allowed.
- Proof of vaccination is required to attend Sunday worship.
