JAMES' JOURNAL Bring a Friend Sunday



According to the UUA, the most frequent way people hear about Unitarian Universalism is through word of mouth. Fully 70 to 90% of people who join a congregation have a friend or relative already in the congregation; 75 to 90% visit because someone invited them. Yet, the average Unitarian Universalist only invites a person to church once every 26 years!

I know it can be scary to invite a friend to church. We don't want to come across like we are trying to convert someone. The word "church" might scare off people. But the reason people join UU congregations is because of people like us.

The best way to invite a friend is to do it clearly and honestly. Ask a friend to experience something that has given you joy and meaning over the years. Your friends will want to know and experience what is important to you. Let them know about our beautiful space filled with beloved people. You may know the perfect way to do this authentically in your words but in case you need a little help, something like this is a good start:

"On Sunday, November 20, my congregation is having a "bring a friend Sunday." There will be a service featuring a sermon about gratitude by our minister and an informal reception following the service. As you know, this is a community that is very important to me, a place where I feel at home. As someone who is also important to me, I want you to see this place and to meet the people who mean so much to me. Will you accept my invitation?"

Our congregation is a special community of hope, friendship, and meaning. We all have experienced that. It's about time our friends experience it as well.

FAITH ENGAGEMENT

Our principles are changing! Our principles are changing!

We are a living faith tradition. We adapt and change our principles, sources, and purpose when both formal and grassroots efforts call us to. The Unitarian Universalist Association national bylaws include a requirement that we study our principles, sources, and purposes at least every 15 years.

Our principles and sources were last changed in 1986. The seven principles we know today were a revision of the 1961 principles that were created when the American Unitarian Association and the Universalist Church of America merged. You can read the

Our Principles and Sources have received updates and proposed changes in the years since 1986. The sixth source, naming Earth-centered traditions, was added in 1995. And in 2017 the second source was updated from the wording of "words and deeds of prophetic women and men" to "words and deeds of prophetic people." The idea of an eighth principle to specifically address the lack of anti-racism language in our existing seven principles came from the work of Paula Cole Jones and Bruce Pollack Johnson in 2013.

The Article II Study Commission was convened in the fall of 2020 and is "charged to review Article II of the UUA Bylaws, and propose any revisions that will enable our UUA, our member congregations, and our covenanted communities to be a relevant and powerful force for spiritual and moral growth, healing, and justice." They are charting the future of our faith and there are ways you can be part of the creation process. The Commission will submit a proposal for a vote at General Assembly 2023. In Memoriam

Nancy Ross Auster 1926 – 2022

Nancy Auster, who lived a full and inspiring life, died peacefully at home on October 14, 2022, surrounded by loved ones. Honored for her many pioneering achievements, she was the first recipient of the SUNY Canton Distinguished Faculty Award, the first woman and first person from a two-year college to become President of the statewide SUNY Faculty Senate, and the First Distinguished Service Professor at SUNY Canton. Nancy is known in the North Country as a runner, triathlete, and duathlete. She competed in over 500 races, won the U.S. Track and Field Women's 5K Title in her age category several times including most recently at 86 years old. A wonderful mother and grandmother and beloved wife of Don Auster, Nancy's optimistic spirit and generous heart lifted us all.



A Celebration of Life will be held for Nancy and Don in the spring or summer of 2023. We will share those details at a later time.






