Quoting from the document linked below: "Article II of the Unitarian Universalist Association (UUA) Bylaws, Principles and Purposes, is the foundation for all of the work of our UUA and its member congregations and covenanted communities. It is the covenant to which all of our congregations and covenanted communities pledge themselves when they become members of our UUA." Article II contains our Principles and Purposes, such as: "The inherent worth and dignity of every person", etc. A Study Commission has met and recommended changes to Article II. You can read their report and compare the current Article II with the proposed Article II <u>here</u>. As you will read, our Principles and Purposes have seen "the forge" before and now are seeing it again. Church Council welcomes your thoughts. I am raising this now so we have ample opportunity to prepare an informed response in time for General Assembly in June.

A Call to Action—from Your Living Room!

Almost 10 years ago, I became a friend to a young person imprisoned in Texas. It has been a rich experience for us both, and John has finally been released on parole. To hear more about my experience as a pen-pal, you can check out my video on the <u>Worthy Now website</u>

I am frequently asked how I came to be writing to John. For many years a small group of UUs like me has been providing support to folks incarcerated across the country by the simple act of writing a letter to each other about once a month. <u>The Church of the Larger Fellowship (CLF-UU)</u> has a core mission of supporting folks in prison through its Worthy Now ministry. Worthy Now provides CLF's prison members with a monthly newsletter and mail-order courses on UU topics and spirituality more broadly. Folks in prison can also take a UU 101 course and then can apply to become a member of CLF and be assigned a free-world pen-pal. Today CLF has over 1000 members in prison, but we do not have enough willing free-world members to assure that each of them who wants a pen-pal can be assigned one.

You can change this! If you've been concerned about issues among our prison populations and are looking for a justice activity that fits your time and situation, this may be just what you are looking for. I have learned so much from John, and he from me... and I have been a much more educated advocate on criminal justice issues. As my pen-pal has been released now, I have asked for and received a new pen-pal who is currently in a federal prison in Texas. I am writing my first letter to Mark today. I eagerly await "meeting" my new friend and supporting him through my letters on his journey.

So, think about it; you can find out more <u>here</u> ... And track me down during social hour at church some Sunday to get your questions answered. This is a truly enriching and reciprocal experience in supporting and being supported by another UU!

Faith in Action Advocates for End-of-Life Decisions

Unitarian Universalists have a long history of supporting our individual control over our lives. Death with Dignity, Compassion and Choices, Medical Aid in Dying and other groups are working to give individuals more say in their end-of-life decisions. A key step, for us, is to become informed about important legislation under consideration in Albany: the "Medical Aid in Dying Act." 2023 may be the year in which the New York legislature may pass "Medical Aid in Dying" bill. This carefully limited bill will, if passed, give New Yorkers options in facing terminal illness. Your help is urgently needed to push this legislation, which has been blocked for several years, forward in 2023. Communicating with key legislators directly (by phone or email) is important (and easy!). We encourage you to consider as well writing letters to editors.

When I was diagnosed with stage 4 endometrial cancer in December 2020, my prospects looked bleak, and what I feared most was the thought of treatments that could lead to a long and pain-filled period leading up to

my eventual death. I would have felt much more in control of my life and body had this bill been law in New York as it is in Oregon, Vermont and 9 other states. Passage of this bill would have enabled me and my doctors to have access to medication that I could take by myself to end my suffering if or when I reached the terminal stages. I could feel comfortable pursuing treatments that might prove difficult to manage. Because we do not have a Medical Aid in Dying law, I had no such peace of mind.

I was fortunate to have beaten this cancer for now, but I know that it could return. Please let your NY Assemblymember and Senator know that you support Medical Aid in Dying, a bill that would respect my autonomy over my own body and which has strong safeguards to prevent any possible abuses. Medical aid in dying allows a mentally capable, terminally ill adult with a prognosis of six months or less to live, to request and receive a prescription for medication that they may choose to take to bring about a peaceful death, so long as they are able to self-ingest the medication. Research shows that a majority of those in other states who get this prescription end up never taking it ... what they DO have is the comfort that they can exercise control over when and how they die. We New Yorkers value our personal autonomy and choices. Please join me in taking action NOW to make this the year we make this option legal for any New Yorker facing difficult end of life decisions.
