FAITH ENGAGEMENT

This past Sunday, as we were preparing for the morning classes, one of the teachers shared that while teaching about the serenity prayer a few Sundays ago, they realized that one of their family members might find these words very helpful right now. Our religious education curriculum often provides these meaningful moments and more – like the connection and relationships created with our children and youth, a deeper understanding of Unitarian Universalism, or maybe even a spiritual awakening. Plus, it's just plain fun!

Religious Education is a cornerstone of our church, and it takes a whole bunch of people to make it happen. Before the pandemic, we had 67 volunteers in RE. This year, we had 27. Summer Worship Series: Our Own Voices

Here is what you can look forward to:

- Coffee and Conversation: About every other week, you will have the opportunity to talk with other community members about topics important to our congregation. These conversations will take place in the Romer Room and will be facilitated by members of the Worship Team, Church Council, and other church groups. Individuals will be able to participate via Zoom. And of course, there will be coffee and tea, juice, and goodies!
- Informal Service: On Sunday, July 16, Rev. James will lead a special service in the sanctuary appropriate for all ages. You will be able to join the service through Zoom like our regular Sunday services, and we hope to have the nursery open for the littlest ones.

Donna Seymour Recognized with Social Action Award

Annually the Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton recognizes a person in the wider North Country community with the **Rachel Somers Grant Social Action Award**. The award honors individuals who are advocates for social justice and who, as volunteers, have been actively involved in local groups working for a stronger community.

This year's recipient is Donna Seymour of Potsdam. As one nominator wrote: "For 30 plus years, Donna has been tireless in her work for the rights of women and children. Anywhere childcare is discussed, Donna is in the middle of it." Beginning with service on the Potsdam Central School PTA, over the past 30 years she has served as Board Chair of the

SLC Childcare Council; as representative on the Advisory Board of the Occupational Health Clinical Centers; and as regional representative for the Empire State Campaign for Child Care (ESCCC). All are organizations which work to improve access to quality child care options, to promote workplace safety, living wages for childcare and elder care providers, and to provide resources to families, providers, community members and employers to meet the early care and learning needs in the North Country.

Additionally, Donna is currently on the leadership team of the PowHer NY Coalition, a statewide network of individuals and organizations committed to accelerating economic equality for New York women and their families. She was active in the local chapter of the American Association of University Women and is currently on the Board of the League of Women Voters of SLC Chapter, which she helped to revive in 2009. She has worked as moderator for the educational "Conversations with Candidates" and regularly participates in "North Country Matters," setting a standard for informed and balanced conversations about local issues.

This award is presented as part of a Sunday, June 4 service at the Unitarian Universalist Church in Canton (3 ½ Main Street) at 10:30 a.m. All well-wishers are welcome to attend; a reception follows the service.

Social Action Shared Offering (SASO) to benefit Potsdam Pride on Sunday, June 4, 2023

On Sunday, June 4, our collection will benefit Potsdam Pride so that they can continue the great work they are doing in our community. Rebecca Donnelly explains its history and mission here:



The Potsdam Pride committee came together with a vision to hold a community Pride celebration in June 2023. In the past year, we've held several fundraising events and social gatherings to prepare for Pride, and the response from the community, queer and otherwise, has been one of overwhelming support. It can be difficult to live openly and authentically as a member of the LGBTQ community in any part of the world, but living in a rural area has its own challenges. There is no gay neighborhood here, no gay bar, no gay bookstore or cafe where queer people can meet other queer people and develop that sense of belonging that everyone deserves. Simply creating a space where our community can gather and feel that they're not alone, even for the length of a drag show, has shown us how crucial it is to keep our efforts going.

We're excited to say that our first Pride Festival is happening June 8-10, but it won't be our last. Thanks to the contributions and support of everyone who has attended one of our events, become a corporate sponsor, volunteered with us, and with special thanks to our partnerships with Planned Parenthood of the North Country and SLC Arts, we're committed to keeping the spirit of Pride in the North Country going.
