JAMES' JOURNAL Attending and Surrendering to New Identities

As I firmly stand within middle age, I have noticed certain shifts in my identity over the years. I sometimes cling to an old identity of a jazz musician who is out at the club all night and practicing incessantly. The person who could stay out all night has long gone and left. Of course, fatherhood changes things. I had to surrender to that loss not knowing how being a parent would change things.

But now I can attend to a modified identity as someone who still enjoys listening and playing jazz but now, I just do it at earlier times and enjoy it with my family. I can still carve a little time each day for music. We don't have to give up everything as we take on new identities. However, as we surrender to new identities, we have to attend to the loss that is sure to come. There are many new identities we take on and transition to. For example, being retired is a new and different identity than working.

It is the same with groups of people and institutions, like our beloved faith community. Our old identity may be shifting and we may not know what will replace it. This can cause anxiety. I think big parts of our identity are excellence in Sunday Worship, Social Justice and RE. Those may have to be modified and attended to as we morph and change as a community.

Nurturing a new congregational identity requires faith. We must trust that something new ahead is worth letting go of something now. I don't know what exactly that new identity is yet, but I sense that our congregation is becoming less Sunday morning focused and more events driven throughout the week. Change is a healthy part of growth and life. There are new identities emerging before us and it will take some faith to surrender to them and attend to them.

Aromatherapy has played an intrinsic role in spiritual and healing practices throughout history and through the centuries. Sandalwood aloe and myrrh were brought by Nicodemus and Joseph of Arimathea to bury Jesus. In Buddhist temples throughout eastern Asia, incense of locally available resins and woods are burned to honor deities and ancestors.

Join holistic healer and certified clinical aromatherapist Kat Wilcox for the Sacred Scents workshop to explore the world of aromatics.

Workshop participants will explore practices to connect with the subtle energetic aspects of natural plant aromatics, and how to use them safely and sustainably.
