#### FROM OUR PRESIDENT Three and One Half Minutes

On April 8, 2024, we will have the very rare opportunity to witness a total eclipse of the Sun for roughly three and one-half minutes as the Moon's shadow passes over us.



Sometimes experiencing the briefest events have the most lasting impact on our lives. We each can recall some momentous news flash, or perhaps seeing one's baby for the first time, or realizing that, in an instant, your life will never be the same from that point forward. We react to such events with the full range of emotions. They grab onto us and force us to pay attention. Such dramatic moments cement the memory and remind us that change is fundamental.

The wonderful thing about the upcoming eclipse is that it will be a shared experience by all. No politics, no factions, no pro-eclipse vs. anti-eclipse tribes, no religious affiliation requirements, no eclipse deniers can affect it. It will happen regardless of one's beliefs. We all get to witness its awesome wonder.

Which brings me around to our *openness to wonder* as Unitarian Universalists. We reach out with our minds and hearts to love the Universe. Infrequent big events can have a major impact on us, but the smaller events of every day comprise the bulk of our lifetimes. There is wonder all around us. I feel that our religious community cultivates self-awareness of both the big and the small, and everything in between. This awareness is the first steppingstone on the path to understanding, wisdom, and love.

So, enjoy the eclipse by viewing it safely - the darkening of the Sun and then the three and one-half minutes when you can actually look at it with just your eyes before it begins to brighten again. When it is over, look at each other and consider what a wonder we are and what a wondrous planet it is on which we live.

On Sunday, April 28 our Social Action Shared Offering (SASO) will support *Seeds of Peace*, an organization that hosts Israeli and Palestinian teens for a conflict resolution summer camps to change the future of the region by teaching the processes of peace.

# RACHEL SOMERS GRANT SOCIAL ACTION AWARD

**Seeking Nominations for the 2024:** Each year, the Unitarian Universalist Church of Canton recognizes an individual who is making a difference in our community with an award established in 1990 in memory of Rachel Somers Grant. Rachel was a teacher and activist who lived in Canton from 1977 until her death in 1990. The award was established to honor those who work, as Rachel did, to make ours a more humane and progressive community.

Recent recipients of the award have included Ginger Storey-Welch, Eileen Raymond, Kathleen Stein and Donna Seymour.

Rachel believed grassroots movements were an effective means of achieving change. She challenged the lack of responsiveness of elected officials on issues important to her community, and she was a strong advocate for causes affecting the welfare of women, families, and the environment. She had a gift for organizing diverse groups and a talent for gaining the respect of supporters and opponents alike.

Nominations for the 2024 Rachel Somers Grant Award should explain how the nominee exemplifies some of the following criteria.

- promotion of local grassroots efforts as a means of achieving social change
  - advocacy on behalf of social justice, especially for those who are marginalized in some way
  - active involvement in a variety of local groups working for a better community
  - history of organizing, involving, and supporting community members in pursuit of social justice
