JAMES' JOURNAL The Art of Gathering



Why do we gather? Not, why are we Unitarian Universalists, but why do we congregate for worship? Well, I might get as many answers as there are members of this congregation: intellectual stimulation, the music, the friends, the inspiring sermons, the community, the learning, and the spiritual growth. Or how about because deep beneath all the cruel turmoil of the world, there is a common

bond knit within us. We are all part of some unnamable mystery. We are all children of the same universe. We all have dignity and deserve to give and receive love. We all need weekly reminders of a spiritual grounding in order to truly live life.

A question I often ask myself when I am preparing worship:

What is the need for these people at this time?

Sometimes it is obvious because there is something going on in the congregation. But oftentimes it is not so clear. There is a plethora of needs that can't be summed up in one easy answer. Lately, it might be the weight and hurt of country -seemingly going in the direction of authoritarianism and oligarchy.

What is it we need and want when we gather? Week by week it might change. Some semblances of hope that we can make it through another week. Or maybe it's a small spark of insight that helps us come to a big decision. We need to gather to celebrate what we have and mourn what we have lost. We need to come together to remind ourselves we are not alone. There are other people out there who have minds like our own, who thirst for justice, and aim to extend compassion out.

There is an art to gathering and it needs to be named and articulated to bring out its truest meaning.

Nicole Kirk is the Frank and Alice Schulman Chair of Unitarian Universalist History at Meadville Lombard Theological School and the Program Minister at All Souls Unitarian Church in Tulsa, Oklahoma, where she resides. FROM YOUR SOCIAL ACTION TEAM:

Helping Immigrants and their Families

The Trump Administration is targeting immigrants and visitors in the US. We can expect these actions to impact our community in various ways, including increased random checkpoints and traffic stops by Border Patrol, as well as ICE raids on local farms.

Our SA Team will be partnering with the Cornell Farmworker Program and similar organizations to disseminate information about immigrant rights (and citizen rights!), as well as organizing information sessions about Know Your Rights and Helping Immigrant Families. Medical Aid in Dying:

This spring, our congregation will continue supporting the campaign to pass the Medical Aid in Dying bill at the State Capitol. The legislation would allow a terminally ill adult with a prognosis of 6 months or less to live to have the option to request, obtain, and decide to ingest medication to die peacefully in their sleep if their suffering is unbearable; it is sometimes referred to as Death With Dignity. Only 10 states allow medical aid in dying to be available, and the issue is one of the priority issues for <u>NYUU Justice</u>. Compassion & Choices organizes the legislative efforts, and they also offer <u>valuable</u> information and resources for individuals and families facing end-of-life decisions.
