JAMES' JOURNAL - Articulating Kindness

The Men's Group has one. The team that led the last Social Justice Initiative has one as well. So do Listening Circles, Church Council, RE, and the staff wrote one a few years back. They all have covenants, but we don't have a congregation-wide covenant.

Covenants are agreements we write ourselves. We all know we want to be kind to each other and expect kindness in return. A covenant articulates what that kindness looks like. Much of the time kindness is implied or assumed. But a covenant spells out expectations and what should happen if we fail to be kind.

A covenant is a living, breathing aspiration, made new every day. It can't be enforced by consequences, but it can be reinforced by forgiveness and by grace, when we stumble, when we forget, and when we mess up.

A covenant is how we aim to journey together across disagreements, dissent, and difficult discernments, cherishing the process as much as the outcome.

A covenant is a way to bring people back into healthy relationship. We will have disagreements. We won't always see eye to eye.

But it is how we disagree that is important.

The practice of promising to journey together is a core part of our living tradition. Covenant is both a noun and a verb.

Creating and agreeing to a covenant can be an extremely effective tool for building a foundation of trust. By creating shared expectations around the behaviors we want to cultivate, we actively create beloved community.

FROM OUR PRESIDENT Caring Together

One of my closest friends lost her father to early onset Alzheimer's, and only one year later, she lost her mother to cancer. She was 15 years old. The deaths of both parents left her and her sister orphaned. My resilient friend created a good life for herself, raising two loving sons, but the stress created by the tragic loss of her parents heavily marked her adolescence and early adulthood.

Unlike my friend, I am in my 60s and blessed to still have both my mother and father with me. However, caring for aging parents weighs heavily on many of us. It seems to be one of the secret stresses of middle age that sometimes catches us by surprise: a serious incident or the accumulation of a series of small changes cause us to realize suddenly that those on whom we have relied since birth are now relying on us.

Fortunately, we are not alone in our struggle to navigate both the complex systems of elder care and the complex feelings of caring for aging parents. Talking with others experiencing the same issues can help.

To facilitate our caring for each other, Mary Michalek, Carol Zimmerman, and I are creating a support group for individuals caring for aging parents. If you would like to be part of this monthly support group, please contact me (president@uucantonny.org) with your interest as well as any questions. You should also feel free to speak with any of us during social hour. We broadly define "caring for aging parents." So, whether you are providing primary in-home care to parents or are considering services for parents who still live independently, you are welcome. We hope to organize the first meeting during the month of June.

RSG SOCIAL ACTION AWARD Rose Rivezzi to be Recognized with RSG Social Action Award



Rachel Somers Grant Social Action Award

The Social Action Team has chosen Rose Rivezzi to be the recipient of this year's Rachel Somers Grant Social Action Award! Rose has served our community in many ways, through her varied work as a public school teacher; a member of the Potsdam Town Board; chair of the Potsdam Climate Smart Community Task Force; creation of Kay's Play Space in Ives Park; and coordinating the Farm to School program as co-owner of Big Spoon Kitchen. Rose will receive the Award during our service on Sunday, June 15.

Helping Immigrants and their Families

Our Social Action Team is teaming up with Catholic Charities and other local groups to bring important resources for immigrant families in the North Country. Catholic Charities has opened an Immigrant Resources office in Ogdensburg, affiliated with their office in Watertown and connected with service organizations in Syracuse. Our SA Team is building a volunteer network to serve as their "ears" (to let them know about local needs and issues), and to be their "boots on the ground" (to help with situations when necessary). During the week of June 23, we're planning to host a *Know Your Rights* information session to help people know how to handle situations such as Border Patrol traffic stops or an ICE visit at homes or workplaces. Date, time, and location will be announced when we nail down the details.

Survey about topic for our next SJI coming soon!

The Social Justice Initiative (SJI) is a program of our church to raise awareness about important problems that we face in our North Country communities, with particular focus on the UU Principles of "justice, equity, and compassion in human relations" and "a free and responsible search for truth and meaning." Each SJI focuses on a specific social justice issue, and brings together people from across our region to make connections, share information and resources, and develop strategies for addressing the issue. Our three previous SJIs have focused on: Bullying and Harassment in Workplaces

(2017); Incarceration and Imprisonment in the North Country (2019); and Cultivating Climate Justice (2023).

The Social Action Team will be soliciting ideas from the entire congregation for the topic for our next Social Justice Initiative, which will likely take place in Fall of 2026. We will be e-mail you a brief survey within the next few weeks. Please keep an eye out for the survey; your feedback is important for our planning of the event.

Medical Aid in Dying bill passed the NY Assembly!

On Tuesday, April 29, the NY Assembly passed the *Medical Aid in Dying* bill! The legislation would allow a terminally ill adult with a prognosis of 6 months or less to live to have the option to request, obtain, and decide to ingest medication to die peacefully in their sleep if their suffering is unbearable; it is sometimes referred to as Death With Dignity. Only 10 states allow medical aid in dying to be available, and the issue is one of the priority issues for NYUU Justice.

Our congregation has been very active in supporting this legislation, honoring the legacy of Eileen Raymond who was a strong advocate for the bill. Congregants have traveled to Albany to meet with legislators and join in rallies, written letters to encourage the legislature's leadership to move the bill, and shared our stories with our families and friends. Our voices were heard, and they made a difference. (see photos below)

There's just two weeks left before the Legislature adjourns (around June 12). We're hopeful that the Senate will follow the Assembly's lead and move the bill before adjournment. While neither of our local Senators supports the bill, you can contact Senate Majority Leader Andrea Stewart-Cousins to thank her for her support of the bill and ask her to bring it to the floor for a vote. At this stage, phone calls are more effective than emails; her office is basically just keeping tally of phone calls for/against the bill, so just plan to say 2-3 sentences to her staff: "Hello, my name is _____, and I live in _____. I'm calling to thank Senator Stewart-Cousins for her support of the *Medical Aid in Dying* bill, #S-138, and I hope that she will bring the bill to a vote on the floor in June. I support the bill because....."
