James's Journal **Pumping the Phantom Breaks**



Driverless semi trucks may be on many major U.S. roads as early as next year. I know human drivers get into plenty of accidents all the time and maybe driverless trucks are statistically safer, but who is responsible when a driverless truck causes an accident or kills someone? Sometimes automated driver's cameras and sensors pick up something that is not there and stop abruptly. This so-called "phantom braking" could easily cause an accident. Driverless trucks are supposed to save money on labor and thus make goods cheaper. But at what cost? What about the millions of truck driver job losses?

What haunts me most is the thought of a runaway semi truck barreling down Route 11 causing damage and death.

I consider myself someone who embraces technology, but I am not an early adopter. Take for instance, AI tools that write essays or even songs. I have spent years, decades really, becoming a good writer and now I can just put in some prompts and *voilà*, a newsletter article. (This was not written by AI!) Maybe AI could write a good sermon. That would be ethically wrong to me, especially if you don't acknowledge it was written using AI. So, I am going to keep writing the sermon the old fashioned way!

War is almost always wrong and I am not going to defend Iran here. I think the current Iran war could have been avoided. A diplomatic solution could have saved billions of dollars and more importantly thousands of human lives. War was never declared by Congress. The war is unconstitutional and therefore illegal. Hardly anyone believes Iran was an imminent threat. Was the Trump administration emboldened to go to war with Iran because Israel asked us? Did Trump want to show the country he had the courage to do what no other president before him was willing to do? There seems to be no clear objective and no clear exit strategy. But what I find most morally hideous is the repugnant deaths of 150 to 170 people at the Shajareh Tayyebbeh girls' elementary school. Though an investigation is still pending, a U.S. missile strike most certainly did it. The primary cause is believed to be human use of outdated intelligence. At what level should human error become a war crime? AI is being used in war. What if AI is responsible for 150 children dying? What then?

Let's pump the phantom brakes.

News from the Social Action Team - Get involved!

The Social Action Team thanks everyone for your generous support of our recent SASOs (Social Action Shared Offerings) for the Bittersweet-Milkweed Farm and the Adirondack Regional Immigration Collaborative’s Emergency Fund. Our next SASO will be for Planned Parenthood of the North Country; please keep an eye out for announcements about the specific date.

Contact Legislators and the Governor to support the New York for All Act

The *New York for All Act* is a bill that's being considered by the NYS Legislature which would provide immigrant communities significant protections from indiscriminate detentions and deportations by ICE. Most importantly, it would:

- Bar ICE from entering sensitive, non-public areas of state agencies such as schools, hospitals, DMV, social services, etc.
- Bar state agencies from colluding with ICE on immigration enforcement.
- Bar law enforcement from wearing masks.
- Require that people in ICE custody be given notice of their rights before interrogation.
- Rescind and ban all 287(g) agreements between ICE and local law enforcement agencies.

The Legislature is negotiating with the Governor's office about the final details of the bill. At this point, it looks like there are enough votes to pass the bill. However, we need to encourage the Leadership of the Assembly and the Senate to bring the bill to the floor as soon as the budget is finished; and we also need to encourage Governor Hochul to sign the bill intact, without weakening it with amendments.

The coalition of groups working to pass the bill are asking *everyone* to call and/or email the Leadership and the Governor *this week*, as a concerted push for the bill. You can use the following simple script (or adapt as you wish):

"Hi, my name is _____, and I live in the town of _____. I'm calling because our County Sheriff has signed a 287(g) Agreement to collaborate with ICE, and the residents of our county are very concerned about ICE coming in and destroying our communities. I urge the

[Speaker/Majority Leader] to bring the New York for All Act for a vote.

[Governor] to sign the bill without weakening it with amendments.

Please support the bill in its entirety, because all NY citizens need the broad protections of the bill. Thank you."

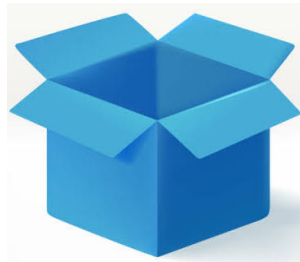
organizations/networks. Our congregation has a long-standing partnership with the Canton Church and Community Program:

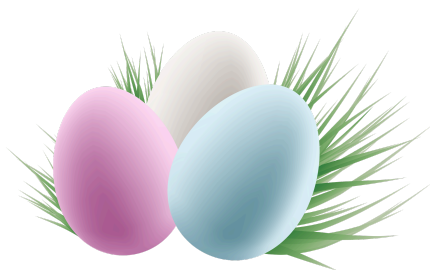
Earth Day Drumming and Dancing
